NEW WATER RATE STRIKE
Users of Great Quantities Appear Before Council With Vigorous Protest.

METER CHARGE REDUCED

Rio Grande May Put Pipe Line from Mill Creek Mts. Service

To Save Money.

The proposed change in water rates was considered for several hours by the city council, sitting as a committee of the whole, in the office of Mayor Brannford yesterday afternoon. In addition to the councilmen, there were present representatives of various companies who are users of water in large quantities. Among those were Parley L. Williams, attorney for the O. S. L. R. R., Ernest Stenger, superintendent of the Rio Grande Western, J. L. Terry of the Troy Laundry, James Dole of the Standard Laundry, William Brannford of the Standard Laundry, and Cold Storage company, Albert Fisher of the Fisher Brewing company and Jacob Moritz of the Salt Lake Brewing and Manufacturing company.

The new water ordinance proposed to fix the rate of 8 cents per 1,000 gallons for domestic use and 7 cents for commercial use. The protest of the big users brought about a reduction of 1 cent in each class, the council finally voting to make the rate 7 cents in the first instance and six in the latter.

Strong arguments were made for a still greater reduction, the contention being that 2 cents per 1,000 gallons was a reasonable rate for the city, and that the rate for the city should be the same as for the surrounding areas. Mr. Stenger said that if more than 5 cents were charged, his company would secure water elsewhere, intimating that they could pipe water from Mill Creek and save money. Similar remarks were made by Mr. Terry, Mr. Williams and others. The rate paid by these companies heretofore has been, on a sliding scale, from 25 cents and upwards per 1,000 gallons, with a record of the following amount of gallons used per annum, with revenue as given:

As voted by the council, the rate now stands 1 cent per 1,000 gallons more than most of the protestants expressed a willingness to pay. After voting the reduction above noted, the ordinance rate for meters for domestic purposes was placed at 60 cents a month, instead of 75 cents, as at present. This was done to encourage the use of meters, there being only about 200 now in use.

NOTED WRITER VISITOR.

Mr. and Mrs. J. S. McCullough Make Short Stop in This City.

Mr. and Mrs. James Sidney McCullough arrived in the city on Tuesday night from a two months' tour of the Pacific coast, and were here for the night and half day previous to resuming their home journey to Chicago. Mr. McCullough has business interests here, having invested in real estate during his previous stay in the city last fall and spent the short time at his disposal between trains, looking after these interests. Mr. McCullough, 50 well and popularly known to the literary world as Myrtle Reed, author of "Lavender and Old Lace," "Spirans in the Sun" and other numerous widely known books. He is now on his way for the second time, having, with Mr. McCullough, stopped in the city on her way home from a trip through the Yellowstone last fall. Mr. and Mrs. McCullough left Chicago just before Christmas, and spent the holiday in the Grand canyon of the Colorado on their way to Phoenix, Arizona, then returned to Ashford, a spot designated by Mrs. McCullough as a great watering place, having large tanks and then proceeded on their way to the coast, visiting San Francisco, Santa Barbara, Santa Cruz, Los Angeles and the surrounding beaches, and San Diego. They then went to Portland, Ore., and thence are returning home.

In this long reach of travel they have had a variety of experiences, interesting, amusing and exciting, the last covering an encounter with the floods about Sacramento, and something like a storm in Arizona which they described as the worst wind storm they have ever been their lot to experience.

One of the amusing things was the acquaintance of a wealthy but eccentric resident of a south California watering place, a man who had built a bungalow and was furnishing it in his own peculiar way. The woodwork in this house was quite plain but painted in a red verging on vermilion; and having purchased a Steinway grand piano, and finding it too ornate to match the unadorned woodwork, he had the carved legs encased in plain square boxes, and the piano painted in the vermilion shade of the house interior with an effect better imagined than described.

Mrs. Reed was entertained at various functions on her way and in nearly every place heard flattering reports of her works. The book dealers especially were complimentary, naming her as among the "best sellers" in their list.

At the date of Mrs. McCullough's last visit to the city, she had just received word of the publication of her recent book, "A Flower of the Desert." Asked for her opinion of the book, she said she had had very favorable news from her publishers, and expects that in March, when she will receive her royalties that for the past six months they will be something like \$20,000. During her last trip she has absorbed material for a new book, not her next, but a future work which will probably follow the one now shortly to be written.

Mr. McCullough is on his way home now to commence her new book which will reach the publishers on April 2. This date is the birthday anniversary of George Putnam of the famous New York book firm of the name and it has been Mrs. McCullough's custom for several years past to celebrate it in this way, a beautifully typewritten copy of her latest work being laid on his desk on that day. One book annually is the author's output, and her next is already planned awaiting only the writing.

It is because of this understood engagement with her publishers that Mr. McCullough could not make a longer stay in Salt Lake. They left yesterday afternoon for Denver for a short stay and will then proceed to Chicago.
