The First Session of the Utah State Legislature.

## FIRE AND POLICE BILL AGAIN.

It Awakes lively interest in the Homeless Killer's Journals  
Bull-County Excess Mortality.

The first item of special interest in the day was the fire and police bill in the House, and a lively right it is, both sides being prepared for a stubborn contest. The most important item in the Senate was the exceedingly watered bill.

## SENATE.

The first business in the Senate, however, was looking to committee reports.

The committee on labor reported on H. B. 10, to provide for the payment of labor in cash, and recommended that it be passed as amended.

The committee on appropriations and accounts reported H. B. 10, for compensation of Joseph P. Brown, Territorial statistician, should go to the House Board of examination; report accepted.

The appropriations committee reported a general bill, H. B. 12, making an annual appropriation for the State school system.

The committee on judiciary reported in favor of the passage of H. B. 21, in relation to debts for real property sold under tax.

A committee was reported by the publisher for Senate concurrent resolution No. 1.

The judiciary recommended the passage of H. B. 24, laws and judgments of the Supreme Court, circuit court of the United States.

The committee on judiciary reported in favor of the passage of H. B. 25, authorizing district courts to confer mandatory powers on assessors and tax collectors.

A committee was reported by the publisher for Senate concurrent resolution No. 2.

The judiciary recommended the passage of H. B. 26, laws and judgments of the Supreme Court, circuit court of the United States.

The committee on judiciary reported in favor of the passage of H. B. 27, in relation to the estates of deceased persons, introduced by Senator Warriner. The committee recommended that the bill be introduced in the Senate, and that it be referred to the committee on judiciary.

The author added that if it goes to the committee on judiciary it will be referred to the committee on public works.

**PROTEST PETITIONS.**

H. B. 28, protest petitions in their wages, was received from the House with amendments. The amendments were considered.

H. B. 29, relative to the payment of salaries to agents in mines, was amended and passed with final reading. There will be considerable discussion on the bill.

To PREVENT FORECLOSURES.

John Miller announced H. B. 30, to prevent foreclosures.

Beth asked what time it was proposed should be furnished journalists, but got no information.

The protest of the bill should be withdrawn.

The author added that if it goes to the committee on public works it will be referred to the committee on public works.

**RELATIONSHIP OF MUNICIPAL POWERS.**

H. B. 31, enlarging the powers of third class cities, was taken up and House amendment, which was not carried in, and Copley, Brown and Chidester were appointed a conference committee.

**MINING BILLS.**

H. B. 32, pertaining to a State board of mining commissioners, was taken up. As heretofore, Copley was absent, so she was present. Mr. Warriner was absent, so he was seconded by Dr. H. C. Warriner next. A motion that it be passed second reading by title was defeated.

Motion.

H. B. 33, amending district courts to enable them to receive high and civil actions, passed its first reading, and was filed for second reading. Jones registered his vote against the bill.

LAW IN U. S. COURTS.

H. B. 34, relative to law and public and criminal statistical reports of the U. S., was taken up and passed without opposition.

**GRIDS EXEMPT FROM TAXES.**

H. B. 35, relative to debts and property taxes and other excise, was taken up and passed without opposition.

**COUNTY CRIMES WARNING.**

H. B. 36, providing for the payment of county warrants issued prior to Jan. 1, 1889, in excess of the legal limit, was taken up and had final passage by the House.

The bill passed without a dissenting vote, and was referred to the House with Senate amendments.

**ARMED VOLUNTEER APPROVAL.**

H. B. 37, special appropriation for the State Normal school, was passed. The amount appropriated is \$20,000.

**ROULEAU.**

The House adjourned yesterday evening with having transacted the following business after press time:

Senate bills to protect employees, servants and laborers in their claims for wages, was read the third time and passed.

House bill 102, to amend section 46 of the company laws of Utah, 1885, relating to charitable institutions, was taken up without reading and further action was deferred.

On the bill, Mr. Lewis, the voter who voted House bill 38, regulating the practice of dentistry, was recommended and the bill read for third reading.

Mr. Morris gave notice of a motion to adjourn, and the motion was carried. House bill 102 was referred to the public health committee.

**TODAY'S STATISTICS.**

At 12 M. city time, the House resumed business. There was a vacuum present, but no projections would cast a shadow over the session. The minutes were read and the routine taken up.

**POSITIONS.**

Two positions were received, and referred to the committee on public works. The three seven residents of Wayne county and presented by Mr. McCallie. The others came from J. H. McCallie and fifty-nine other railroad employees at Ogden, presented by Mr.

Utah. Both petitions asked the passage of Senate Bill 12, on elections.

## AS TO TAXES.

The new state committee reported amendments to H. B. 36, relating to surveys, and recommended the passage of the bill. On motion of Mr. McCallie the report was adopted.

## AS TO SURVEYS.

The same committee reported on Senate Bill 12, to prevent the growth of cities among sheep, recommended for passage.

## THE LAND BILL.

The committee on land stock recommended the passage of Senate Bill 12, providing for the recovery of lands for squatters by removal of trespassers.

## POLICE AND FIRE BILL.

The municipal corporations committee presented and City of Alpine, Salt Lake City, as well as Alpine, Cache, Carbon, Sanpete, Sevier, San Juan, Iron, Beaver, Box Elder, Uintah, and Sanpete, relating to fire and police laws. The mayors report recommends the retention of House Bills 12 and 13, and the passage of Senate Bill 12, with amendments proposed.

## MILITARY PAYROLL.

A minority report from Mr. Cottle was read as follows:

"A minority of your committee on municipal corporations, recommending that the bill be retained in the Senate, and the report of the committee on military payrolls be rejected." The bill was rejected.

The committee on judiciary reported in favor of the passage of H. B. 21, in relation to debts for real property sold under tax.
