**THE SACKVILLE MATTER.**

English, German and Other Opinions

LONDON, Oct. 31.—The Press Association announces that Lord Sackville comes to England immediately on

leave of absence; that he has important business to attend to in connection with his succession to the Sackville estates, and will not return to Washington.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31.—By the action of the government yesterday Lord Sackville is no longer recognised as minister, and the first secretary of the British legation naturally becomes the official representative.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 31.—A special from Pomona, California, says: Chairman Price of the National Democratic Committee has telegraphed the local Democratic committee to "ascertain whether Joseph E. LONDON, Oct. 31.—The *Daily News* says: Lord Saville may be congratulated upon having involved his country in the most serious misunderstanding with America that has occurred since the settlement of the Alabama claims. There was not much in

the letter, but he might at least have held his tongue afterwards. He has succeeded in making bad worse, and has deepened the impression, previously very slight, that he intended to oust the American government with a casus belli in international dealings. That is an accusation which, even if true, no high-spirited people would endure from the representative of a foreign power.

The News regrets Mr. Bayard's apparent lack of courtesy and thinks Lord Salisbury has shown a want of judgment. He ought to have acted more coolly, it says, except that Cleveland emerges from the quarrel very creditably.

The *Post* says: The political necessities are too strong for public men in America. Hence the President was driven to offer the affront to Minister Sackville and the friendly country he represents.

The *Daily Telegraph*: We confess ourselves, however, far too much the friend of America to enjoy the spectacle of its government, driven by an ignominious trick and election howl, to behave good manners overboard and adopt a course which, in private life, would be regarded as full of shame.

The times are so ridiculous, especially in the United States, that it is hardly necessary to witness them. The hurried and unmannerly haste with which America has endeavored to punish a slight upon England before the latter could deal with the matter one way or the other. Mr. Bayard has had the satisfaction of proving to the world that he can be as contemptuously disrespectful of the decrees of international intercourse and the dignity of the nation he represents, as Mr. Bismarck is alleged to have been.

**SPEECH BY BAYARD.**

**He Delivers an Address in Balti-**

BALTIMORE, Oct. 31.—Three thousand democrats attended the meeting at Oratorio Hall, under the auspices of the Jefferson Democratic Association. Secretary Bayard was the speaker, and when he was introduced to the audience, was accorded an ovation seldom given a public man in Baltimore. In his speech he reviewed the *issues* of the campaign and spoke in terms of the highest eulogy of President Cleveland, Judge Thurman, and the acts of the present administration.

"Believe me," said he in this por-

tion of his name. "The lack of time
