CONF. JAN. 1.—The feud existing between the Irish bishops and the Parnellites, which has been smoldering since the election in North Kilkenny, again burst forth fiercely today, and a most bitter feeling pervaded both camps.

Mayor Hogan, an earnest supporter of Parnell, was installed at the town hall as mayor of Cork today and a scene of emotional excitement on the part of the Parnellites. No anti-Parnellites were present.

A rumor was circulated early in the day that there was trouble brewing for the Parnellite mayor. The trouble manifested itself when arrangements were being made during the morning for the usual installation ceremony at the Catholic cathedral, which is always formed part of the day's proceedings. The Parnellites were then informed, first by rumor and afterwards by positive fact, that the installation ceremony at the cathedral must be abandoned, as Bishop O'Callahan refused to receive the Parnellite mayor.

This information was greeted with a sigh of relief by the Parnellites, who are now convinced that the battle with the priesthood is only in its early stages, and that a long and desperate struggle for supremacy between themselves and the priests will take place. It is believed that Ireland if Parnell remains at the head of a faction of the Irish party.

The Feud Between the Bishops and the Parnellites.

CONF. JAN. 1.—The feud existing between the Irish bishops and the Parnellites, which has been smoldering since the election in North Kilkenny, again burst forth fiercely today, and a most bitter feeling pervaded both camps.

Mayor Hogan, an earnest supporter of Parnell, was installed at the town hall as mayor of Cork today and a scene of emotional excitement on the part of the Parnellites. No anti-Parnellites were present.

A rumor was circulated early in the day that there was trouble brewing for the Parnellite mayor. The trouble manifested itself when arrangements were being made during the morning for the usual installation ceremony at the Catholic cathedral, which is always formed part of the day's proceedings. The Parnellites were then informed, first by rumor and afterwards by positive fact, that the installation ceremony at the cathedral must be abandoned, as Bishop O'Callahan refused to receive the Parnellite mayor.

This information was greeted with a sigh of relief by the Parnellites, who are now convinced that the battle with the priesthood is only in its early stages, and that a long and desperate struggle for supremacy between themselves and the priests will take place. It is believed that Ireland if Parnell remains at the head of a faction of the Irish party.

BEKINS AND BEALY HENRED.

DUBLIN, Jan. 1.—Lord Mayor Beal was installed at a scene of considerable excitement today, the crowds present and the method of Beal's name was chosen.

THE PARNELL CONFERENCE.

LONDON, Jan. 1.—Notwithstanding all that has been said, the best informed people in the Irish party believe that the conference between Parnell and O'Brien will not be without result, and that Parnell, after all, find it a pretext for an honorable retirement from the field. Mr. O'Brien, just before his departure for Paris, looked very much exhausted, apparently suffering from rheumatism after the excitement of the Kilkenny campaign.

Mrs. O'Shea, it is admitted by Mr. Parnell's adherents, has been all along opposed to the course of the Irish leader in entering upon a political struggle after the divorce, and all his influence has been used to draw him back to seclusion. Mrs. O'Shea, it is said, had an opportunity, for the first time in weeks, for a prolonged interview with Parnell, and it is believed by those who know both of them that the result will be a compromise, with the conference as a shield for carrying out Parnell's previously formed determination.

PARNELL'S SUCCESSOR.

DUBLIN, Jan. 1.—It is understood that Parnell will not be succeeded by John Dillon, now in New York, but that Parnell consents to retire from the leadership of the Irish party. It is further understood that the Bologn conference was adjourned in order to await Dillon's reply.

IN WASHINGTON.

Disagreeable Weather, and Streets Filled with Slush.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—The weather was very disagreeable today and the streets were filled with slush. The President's reception party at the White House was a feature of the day, and the White House was never more prettily decorated.

View President Morton and Mrs. Morton and all the members of the cabinet, with the ladies of their families, participated in the reception. Mrs. Blaine had previously joined the President and Mrs. Harrison and followed them down stairs to the reception room.

The members of the diplomatic corps were received. All were full of sympathy for the President and his wife. The reception was a most gorgeous affair. They were met by Secretary Root, Secretary Bryan, Secretary Barton, the Italian minister, Mr. Parnell, and the American members of the International Monetary Conference, and the International Railway Conference, and the members of the Court of Claims, and the District judiciary followed. The reception and the reception next day in and were succeeded by the army and navy officers in full uniform. After them came a long line of military and naval officers, and the general public reception began at 12 o'clock, but the disagreeable weather and the difficulty of pedestrianism made the attendance light.

The other official receptions were well attended, and of the people who visited the White House calling on the Vice-President and members of the cabinet, all except Secretary Tracy keeping open houses.

Secretary Blaine gave the diplomatic corps a breakfast immediately after the reception at the White House, and afterwards received the public. Miss Blaine invited him.
