Funeral of E. B. Chester—The funeral of E. B. Chester, the west Fifth South street restaurateur, was held yesterday afternoon under the auspices of the local lodge of Easterns with burial in City cemetery.

Moran Gets Four Contracts; Will Not Pay Big Forfeiture

The board of public works Saturday absorbed P. J. Moran from paying \$25 forfeiture per day for 290 days which he contracted when he completed the laying of the water mains in Fifth South street last year. The contract was made out in December, 1906, and the time for completing the work fixed at July 15, 1907. The time limit was never changed, although the contract was not awarded until March 21 and work did not begin until April 19, 1907. The work was completed Jan. 7, 1908, and had the forfeiture clause been enforced Moran would have lost \$1,125.

WILL DISCUSS BONDS WILL FIGHT LIQUOR

City Council Will Probably Pass Ordinance Calling Upon People to Vote on Proposition.

Several matters of importance are scheduled to come up for consideration at the meeting of the city council this evening, among them being the proposed issue of \$900,000 in bonds, and the ordinance of the mayor of the bill submitted by Contractor Kennedy for \$3,385.54 for pumping water out of the intercepting sewer.

In regard to Mayor Bransford's disapproval of the bill of Contractor Kennedy for pumping water from the intercepting sewer, the council last week considered the veto, and out of courtesy to the mayor, deferred action on the same.
