Hog values today are about 10 cents lower than last week's quotations. The top today was 6:30, and prices ranged from 5.45 for common lights, to 6.50 for prime heavies,

The general advance that was inau gurated in last week's sheep market is still in evidence, the net advance the past zeven days amounting to exactly 45 cents on Western lambs, and other grades in about the same ratio. looks as though it will be con tinued indefinitely, as today's price were the highest of the week. Still 6:60 looks like good value for 70-pound lambs, and the old adage 'It is a good time to sell when you have a buyer' might be appropriately suggested at the present writing.
