Descret News: "I have just learned this morning that my name has been suggested for governor: that the statement is made that I am a candidate for that distin-guished office. The statement is not true. Circumstances are such that I cannot accept the office, wherefore I shall not strive to obtain it. Besides I have jiedged my support to Hon. E. H. Callister of Salt Lake, and shall do what I can to secure his nomination. "Respectfully." "T. C. CALLISTER."

At the first shot the eagle fell a few feet but still continued its flight.
