LOCAL BRIEFS.

Fort Duchesne and Mazon are receiving mail six days in the week instead of two days as heretofore.

Mr. and Mrs. J. C. McClain will give a harvest home dinner at their residence this evening, in aid of the First Methodist church building fund.

M. E. Pack, Jr., of Sugar House ward, was given a reception last evening in the ward meetinghouse, with an entertainment and musical program preparatory to his going on a mission.

Invitations have been issued for the formal opening of the new armory on Pleasant street, next Wednesday evening. The reception will begin at 8:30, and dancing at 9 o'clock.

The daughters of the Pioneers held their regular meeting in the old Deseret News building at 3 p. m. today when Mrs. Susan Young Gates read a paper on "Who Gave You Your Name?"

George E. Cope, who gives his occupation as a laborer, has filed a petition in bankruptcy in the federal court. He names his assets at \$20,000, of which \$15,000 is claimed to be exempt, and his liabilities at \$275.

Mrs. E. P. Card of 601 Spencer street, Portland, Or., writes the postmaster, inquiring as to the possible whereabouts of her 25-year-old son, Charles Card, who was seen in this city two years ago, and of whom all trace has been lost.

CURE FOR CANCER.

Formula That May Benefit Those Afflicted With Dread Disease.

George M. Peck, a Tahitian missionary, sends the following to the "News" in the hope that it may benefit those afflicted with cancer:

A cure for cancer is a small herb known by the name of Sheep Sorrel. The latin name is Rumex Acetosella. It is known to grow in Iowa and is found in all other prairie states. It is found after harvest in the wheat and corn fields. The herb is about four or five inches high, is quite sour and therefore not very palatable.

Making the cancer medicine is very easy and simple. Gather the sorrel late in the season when it has its full strength; pound it up and squeeze the juice out through a cloth; put the juice into a plate or any shallow dish; in the sun to evaporate. When it reaches the consistency of pomatum, or any other ordinary salve, it is ready for use, and can be kept in any jar or box.

Don't use the roots, just gather the bushes above the ground. To apply it, simply spread a little on the cancer like applying any other salve. It follows and kills the roots of the cancer. Keep applying for a few days until the burning stops and then the cancer is dead.

Capt. R. B. Doon, a native of Iowa, who is now living in Mangarua, Gambia islands, says he never knew that a cancer was dangerous until he became quite old. He thought all people had to do was to put some cancer cure on it and that was all there was to it. He also says he never knew his father, Mr. Doon, to lose a case of cancer.
