Intend to "Skip" Without Paying
A BILL

MCDONALD'S CASE IN COURT.

John C. Cannon Liberated—Conviction
—Civil Case—General Court
Business.

Mrs. A. Butterworth, who conducts a general merchandise business in this city, had resources to the courts today to avoid being beaten out of a bill, according to a statement on file with U. S. Commissioner Morris Sommer. He pleaded out against Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Stuck, for \$21,000 due her, some of the goods having been bought on credit, last. The reason for this prompt effort to collect the debt is information that the defendant's means to evade payment by skipping beyond the plaintiff's reach; therefore the arraignment was delayed until settlement is effected.

Upon this point, Judge Howard informed two witnesses, Wm. E. and Louis Beckert, to show that the alleged missing witness, Noble, was in the city on Friday last, notwithstanding the testimony of the defense that he was not. Judge Howard stated that the defendant was seeking his power to defer the trial and doing so was putting the Territory to unnecessary expense.

The defense, however, were given the defendant another opportunity to produce the witness, and at 2 p. m. would fix the time when the case would be called for trial before Judge King, who was coming to hold court in Judge McDaniel's absence. The defense contended that the trial date of the McDaniel case be passed off the 26th and the new date was excused until that date, with an order that they go to trial at that time.

John C. Cannon has secured his freedom, and the indictment no longer hangs over him. The witness for the prosecution not being on hand when his case was called for trial today, he was ordered released on his own recognizance.
