

that, mostly through a few traders who have occasionally visited them. They expect to produce their food and clothing or do without. Their wheels and looms are of very simple construction, and the process of manufacture slow and tedious compared with the same labors in the households of the whites. They have but few tools of any kind and those are of poor quality.

The Oriba community had eight work shops in which their clothing and all other articles in use among them were manufactured. All the men of the village were organized to work in these shops. Care is taken that members of the same family work in different shops, that the spirit of competition may not divide the community into family parties, but be kept in a healthy channel.

**THE BOOMERANG.**

A singular coincidence, and one which gives room for some speculation is the fact that the Moquis use a similar instrument of destruction to that used by the natives of Australia, which is called by the whites who live in that country a boomerang. It is made of hard, heavy wood, generally of oak. It is in the form of a right angle, with the angle rounded. The sides vary in length according to the strength of the person who is expected to use it, but they are generally about 15 inches long. They are from two and a half to three inches in width, about an eighth of an inch thick, and worked to an edge. Strongmen will throw these instruments with great precision, 150 or 200 yards and break the skull of a man, or the leg of an antelope. The boys commence practicing with light instruments when very young and kill small game with them while herding sheep and goats.
