

It appears O'Donnell dogged Carey from London. Both sailed on the steamer *Kinfaul Castle*. The *Daily Telegraph* says the government have little doubt that Carey was followed from Dublin. They believe that the Fenians had taken most elaborate measures to prevent his escape. According to latest accounts the murder occurred at sea. Carey was not killed outright, but died shortly after he was shot. O'Donnell surrendered himself quietly. He was placed in irons, and handed over to the police when the *Melrose* arrived at Port Elizabeth.

Later advices about the killing of James Carey show he was shot while talking upon the *Melrose* at Port Elizabeth. O'Donnell, his slayer, is in custody. The government had taken special and expensive measures to protect Carey.

Carey was leaving under the name of Power. His family were with him. He embarked at Dartmouth. From Maderia he wrote a letter to the authorities, in which he described the voyage, and said he had shared in conversation in which the invincibles and the miscreant Carey were especially denounced. He said he intended to forget Ireland ever existed.

Alexandria, 30.—An analysis has been made of the water of the Nile, which shows that it is infected with putrid matter to above the cataracts.

Seven deaths from cholera occurred yesterday.

Three hundred and thirty deaths from cholera occurred here on Sunday, and 443 at 20 other places between Sinyet and the Mediterranean.

The government is considering the project of burning other dangerous quarters of the city, like Boulak.

Father Patrick, acting Catholic chaplain to the British forces stationed here, died of cholera.

Berlin, 30.—No ministers will be present at the interview between the Emperor of Germany and the Emperor of Austria at Ischl, August 7th. The Crown Prince of Austria will attend the manoeuvres of the German army.

Nuremberg, 30.—At the chess congress here, Winawer won the first prize, Blackburne the second, Mason the third.

Durban, 30.—It is denied that Dababmanzie, brother of Cetewayo, has been killed.

Bremen, 30.—The Senate has issued an order that all captains of vessels arriving from America with packed pork in part of their cargo to specify the quantity they have on board, under pain of 300 marks fine for neglect to do so.

Rome, 30.—A dispatch from Naples just received says it is now stated that a number of persons killed by the earthquake on the island of Ischia Saturday night was 2,000; number of wounded 1,000.

It is stated as certain that four thousand persons perished on the island of Ischia on Saturday night. The stench from the dead bodies of human beings and animals is almost unendurable. Several men and women were rescued from the ruins Monday morning. Many more might have been saved if the large force of rescuers had been available earlier. Many persons who were heard groaning during the night were dead before they could be reached and carried to places of safety.

Survivors say 37 persons were entombed in their rooms in the Hotel Piccola Sentenella. Count Bergardi after three hours' exhausting labor rescued eleven persons, but failed to accomplish the principal object of his efforts, the saving of his sister. The play at the theatre on Saturday night was a burlesque, which opened with a scene representing an earthquake.

Midnight.—Two thousand soldiers digging in the ruins saved 1,000 lives up to midday Sunday, and exhausted 24 persons alive Monday.

Of the foreigners staying at Calomicciola only three were saved who were in the theatre Saturday night. The survivors state that they were obliged to pass Saturday night in absolute darkness, without daring to move even to assist those calling for help beneath the ruins. There is little hope of more being still alive. According to the latest estimate, 3,000 perished on the island. Soldiers are searching for the victims fatally injured to-day. Subscriptions are opened throughout Italy for the relief of the distressed.

Roman newspapers appeared to-day with mourning borders. Many people injured in Ischia will be crippled for life. The dead at Porto number 800; at Laccameo, 500; at

Fontana Serrara, 200. Twenty-four children perished in Misefloridia asylum. The King and Queen of Italy have subscribed 100,000 liras, and the Pope 25,000 liras for the relief of the sufferers.

LONDON, 31.—O'Donnell, who shot Carey, was accompanied from England by his wife, who appeared to be on intimate terms with Carey criminally during the voyage.

The *Times* pronounces the death of Carey a public misfortune, and says he had been the instrument of justice, and his murder is calculated to encourage daring and lawless spirits to commit acts of violence. The joy caused in Ireland by the informer's death is proof that many elements of danger still exist there.

Third class berth on the steamer *Kinfaul*, were secured June 30th, at the Dublin office of Donald, Currie & Co., for the Port of Elizabeth, for a Mr. Power and his wife and seven children, which it is well known was the exact number of James Carey's family. July 21, O'Donnell secured a passage for himself and wife on the same steamer, of Donald Currie & Co. He was not aware, until yesterday of the identity of Power. Carey died without speaking after he was shot. O'Donnell is an Irish American. He denies that he knew who Carey was previous to his arrival at Capetown. It is reported that an infernal machine was found in O'Donnell's possession.

Naples, 31.—An eye witness describes the scene at the Theatre at Casamicciola, when the earthquake occurred, as an awful one. The curtain had just risen when a tremendous shock was felt, a fearful roar followed and the ground rocked like a ship in a storm. A great cry of terror rose from the audience, who were thrown into a heap, and a large number buried beneath the timbers of the building which fell in. Then two more shocks occurred. All who could rushed out of the Theatre, and hundreds clambered into trees in the vicinity for safety; most of the people however escaped to the shore where bonfires were lighted as signals of distress. Hundreds of half naked men and women, wild with terror and grief, ran to and fro among the ruins with torches during the night searching for missing friends.

Searching the ruins for bodies of the victims of the earthquake in Ischia was continued during the night. All the bodies recovered were buried immediately to prevent miasma.

Naples, 31.—Among the persons who were on the island of Ischia on Saturday night, and who have been missing since the earthquake occurred, was a Mr. Sommer an English or American gentleman. He resided at the hotel Mauzi.

LONDON, 31.—Special dispatches state there were eight deaths at Alexandria from cholera yesterday. A surgeon in the British forces at Cairo telegraphs to the war office that the general health of the troops is good. He says the cholera is less virulent at Cairo, and that cases under treatment are more hopeful.

PARIS, 31.—The Cabinet has fixed the extra budget at 25,400,000 francs.

LONDON, 31.—The Colonial Secretary informed the Lords that negotiations with Canada in regard to immigration were pending, and he hoped would result satisfactory.

A correspondent at Capetown says O'Donnell only took passage for Capetown, but learning that Carey was a fellow-passenger he continued on the journey with him on the steamer *Melrose*, and shot him when that steamer was close to Algoa Bay in the presence of the informer's family. O'Donnell is calm. He is strongly guarded, as rumors are afloat that an attempt to rescue him will be made. A fund to be used in defending him is being collected.

An American named Hamant in Paris with his wife and friend, lost his way in the streets on Thursday last. Being lame he became nervous and much distressed. The police noticing his agitated condition believed him insane and arrested him. He was consigned to a mad house and only recovered by his friends on Monday.

Lenning, the German-American student arrested in Switzerland for killing a fellow-student in a duel near Wurzburg, is released from custody, the Swiss authorities holding his offense not extraditable.

The deaths by the earthquake at Ischia are placed at 5,000.

It is worthy of note that a rumor prevailed in Nationalist circles in London on Sunday night last that James Carey had been shot. An item stating that he had been killed was tendered to a news agency in

London at midnight on Sunday, but refused, as no authority was given for the statement. It has since been ascertained a telegram had been received at Paris from Brindisi, which was forwarded to London Sunday night, reading "James Carey has been shot; thank God." As the steamer *Melrose*, on which Carey was shot, did not reach Port Elizabeth until Monday, either this statement was based on a mere surmise, or the statement which was openly made in certain Nationalist circles to the effect that it had been prearranged to kill Carey on the last Sunday of July was true.

Unauthenticated rumors are current that O'Donnell is a relative of Joe Brady, one of the Phoenix Park murderers, hanged recently; and that the vigilantes are cognizant of the abode of Peter Carey.

A fund is being collected in London to be used in defending O'Donnell.

The *Times* says: We are able to state that official news is received from a Continental capital that a most dangerous Nihilist conspiracy has been discovered in Russia. A great number of people are implicated, and many arrests are made.

Deaths from cholera among the British troops in Egypt number 6 at Ismailia, 1 at Cairo, 1 at Hillonare, 1 at Elwendan. The deaths among the natives in Egypt inclusive of those at Cairo, numbered 429, including 17 at Rosetta.

Advices from Casamicciola say a number of English and Americans had arrived there in search of friends and relatives, supposed victims of the calamity. An American lady reports her aunt missing, and it is feared she is buried in the ruins. One family was rescued after being 36 hours entombed. Of a Swiss family, named Pascal, numbering eight, only one, a daughter, survives. She states that she heard her father groaning several hours before she herself was rescued. The Syndic states that 1,000 are dead at Lacco, 1,000 at Fairo and 2,500 at Casamicciola. Damage to property 2,000,000 lire. Shocks of the earthquake were felt at Wiesbaden, Marseilles and Messageries.

A Mediterranean steamer has arrived here: two persons died on board from cholera. The passengers will be closely confined and the steamer thoroughly disinfected.

Fifteen hundred tons of chloride of lime were used at Casamicciola during the day, for deodorizing purposes, but the stench in the upper town is still unbearable.

Water gushed violently out of the springs again to-day; it was almost boiling hot. A slight shock was felt Monday night; two guards were killed. The military prevent the landing of all persons not provided with special passes.

Dublin, 31.—A mob entered some houses on Abbey street to night and seized some bedding, furniture and other articles with which to make bonfires in celebration of the death of James Carey. Effigies of Carey were burned, and mock funerals held in various Irish towns to-night.

Eight enormous bonfires blazed around Cary's residence. There were also fires in other streets. Bands marched through the streets playing national airs, followed by crowds of people, cheering as they

marched. A slight collision occurred between the crowd and police officials. It is feared the Fenians must be emboldened by these demonstrations.

Paris, 31. The action of the British House of Commons on the Suez Canal question gives satisfaction to the press and people of France, and is considered a guarantee.

The peace treaty between France and Tunis will be submitted to the Chamber of Deputies to-morrow. It confirms the establishment of the French protectorate, and says the Bey will undertake reforms, and France will grant Tunis support.

Vienna, 31.—The municipality voted a large sum of money toward the relief of the earthquake sufferers in Ischia.

Oporto, 31.—An earthquake was felt here to-day, and caused great alarm.

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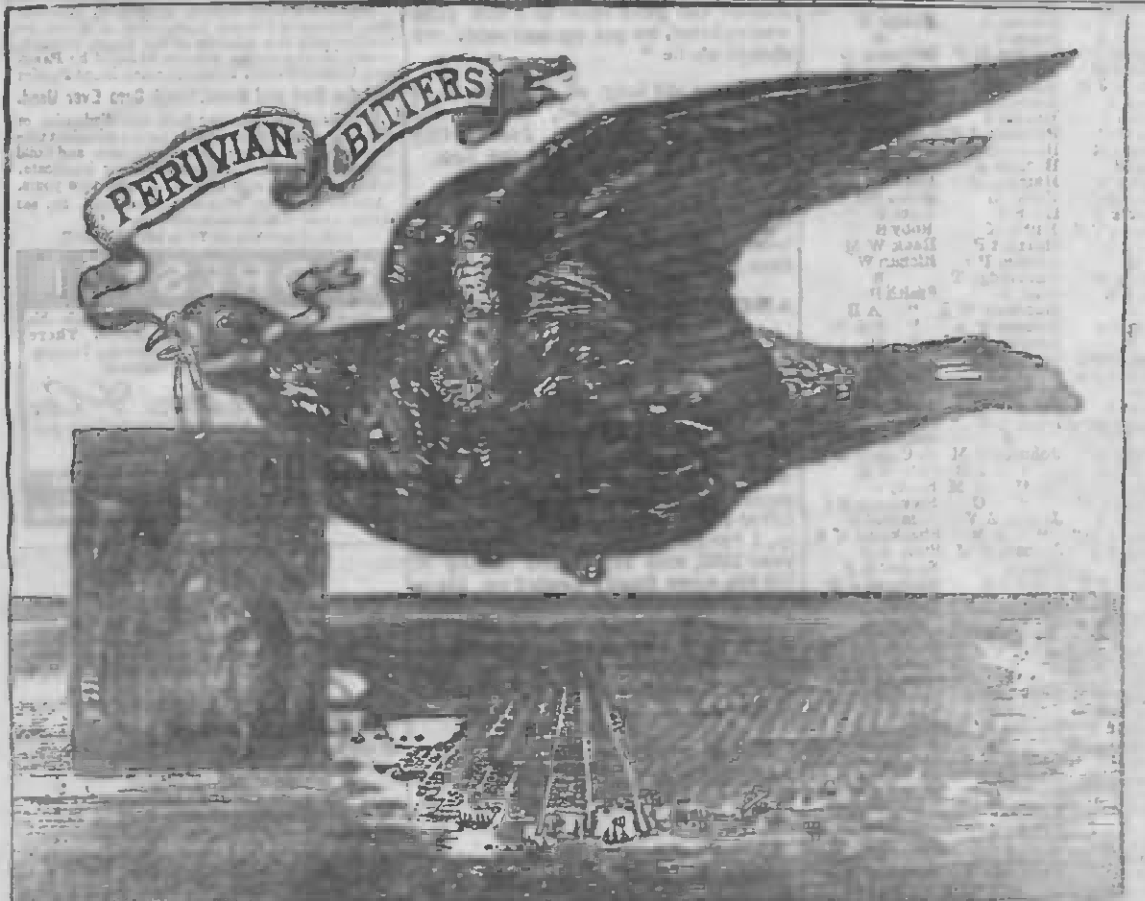
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
