JERRY DARMER CHIEF ACROBAT

Late Partisan of Lippman Flops Suddenly Over Into McMillan Camp.

HAD TO COME OUT IN OPEN

Christensen Executes Similar Gymnastic Feat—"American" Candidates All "Up in the Air."

Chairman J. E. Darmer of the "American" party, who is popularly referred to as the king of acrobats, has caused consternation among Joseph Lippman's supporters by his sudden flop into the mayoralty camp of Henry G. McMillan.

For several weeks, Darmer has been carrying water on both shoulders, but without much success. Darmer has beaten a trail between the two respective camps with his oil can settling up small differences and praising both candidates. In this way he has incurred the displeasure of the supporters of both candidates and a demand has been made that he come out in the open and declare himself or keep his hands off the situation until after the convention.

Frank R. Christensen, clerk of the board of public works, who started the McMillan campaign, has switched and is now assuming the leadership among the Lippman supporters. McMillan is Christensen's boss and this queer situation has caused considerable consternation.

For a long time, McMillan did not know whether he wanted to become a candidate or not, on account of his fight with Mayor Bransford and City Engineer Kealey. Before McMillan was advised by Thomas Kearns to become a candidate, Lippman solicited the support of Christensen and the latter promised to take charge of his campaign.

RIVES IS WINGED. Ben S. Rives, deputy city recorder, who has announced himself as a candidate for the recordership, has been winged by Darmer who is making up a slate with the assistance of the "advisory" board. John Pike is said to be the candidate. Rives was turned down because he has been connected with the politicians who have done everything in their power to induce Christensen to accept nomination.

John E. Moreton, city recorder, is after the nomination for councilman in the Second precinct against L. D. May. The latter has met with considerable opposition on account of his alliance with the liquor interests.

Thomas R. Black, who is a candidate for councilman from the Third precinct, is having his troubles. The opposition against him is strong. Dr. C. I. Douglas has been mentioned to succeed him.

In the other wards, a number of aspirants for the councilman ticket are enlisting the support of members of their respective districts. Some are making overtures to Lippman and others to McMillan. With all this hubbub, Darmer is so muddled that he and his "advisory" board cannot come to an understanding of any of the candidates for the council.
