ISSUE ADDRESS

Appeal to Each of Representatives Of the Powers.

RUSSULMEN ARE BLAMED.

Our Systematic Persecution Has Compelled Christians to Institute A General Uprising.

Sofia, Aug. 10.—The delegates here of the Macedonian committee have addressed the following appeal to each of the representatives of the powers:

"Your Excellency: The delegates of the Macedonian committee have the honor to bring to your notice the following resolution, with the request that you communicate it to your government:

"The Mussulman's systematic persecution has compelled the Christians in Macedonia and the vilayet of Adrianople to institute a general uprising. They have had recourse to this extreme measure after exhausting all peaceful means to secure the intervention of Europe to enforce the provisions of the Berlin treaty. At the present moment intervention is the only means of remedying the evil and stopping the bloodshed. The sporadic efforts of the powers to secure reforms have failed; they have resulted merely in a recrudescence of Turkish fanaticism and greater oppression.

"It is evident that reform measures to be efficacious must include the appointment of a Christian governor general in Macedonia and that no one who has never held office under the Porte, and who must be independent of the Turkish government in the exercise of his functions, and the further appointment by the powers of a joint permanent administrative board, with full power to deal with any disturbance.

"Having published the foregoing facts to the civilized world and made known the causes which have driven the Macedonians to despair, the committee for the Macedonians, now in arms, propose to continue the fight until the object of their uprising has been attained.

"(Signed) For the committee: 'DRS. TATARTCHEFF, 'CHRISTO AND MATOFF'.

POWERS EXCHANGE VIEWS.

Rome, Aug. 10.—It is stated here that there has been an exchange of views between the powers regarding the situation in Macedonia and that apparently the powers have decided to support Austria and Russia in their efforts to re-establish peace. Reports previously received here from Italian consuls in the Balkans predicted the present revival of the insurrection, which the consuls considered to be almost entirely the work of Boris Saraffov, the Macedonian agitator, who is now in command of the insurgents. It being pointed out that the attitude of the Bulgarian government has been correct since re-commencing its operations in Macedonia.

The plan of Saraffov, as understood, is to bring about European intervention by provoking the Turks to a massacre, and the murder of the Russian consul at Monastir. M. Kostovskov, is considered here to have played into the hands of the revolutionists in this respect. M. Kostovskov is represented here as being a very arrogant official, who, upon occasions, bored the ears of soldiers and police whose conduct displeased him.

CARRIE NATION'S CONVICTION.

One for Selling Hatchets Declared to Be Illegal.

Scranton, Pa., Aug. 10.—Carrie Nation's summary conviction for selling hatchets in violation of a city ordinance was declared illegal by Judge Newcomb today when her application for writ of habeas corpus came before him. The writ was sustained, owing to the fact that the magistrate's record was defective. Mrs. Nation's counsel will bring suit against the city for \$50,000 damages for false arrest and imprisonment.

WHISTLER AND ROYAL ACADEMY

Mr. Leslie Says American Was Not Despoiled or Rejected.

London, Aug. 10.—George Dunlap Leslie, a landscape painter, who is a member of the Royal Academy, prints a letter in the Times this morning, in which he refuses the statement that the Royal Academy ever despoiled or rejected the late James McNeill Whistler or his pictures. Mr. Leslie says: "It must be generally known that although the council of the academy have special rules and restrictions against the admission of the works of foreigners, they never apply them to American artists."

JAPANESE NON-PARTISANS.

Want Government to Invite Russia To Terminate Complications.

Tokio, Japan, Aug. 10.—A number of public men, including Prince Konoye, president of the house of peers, and Count Itagaki (formerly minister of the interior) and Kuma, have formed a non-partisan association for the purpose of urging the government to invite Russia to terminate the causes of the present international complications and establish full guarantees for peace.

Lower Californians Coming In.

San Diego, Cal., Aug. 10.—Natives of Lower California are reported to be crossing the line into the United States at Campo in large numbers because of a general conscription that is now being carried on for the Mexican army. The natives are busy rounding up the natives for a five-years' term in the army. The pay is poor and the men object to the conscription.

EJECTION OF SONNERS.

Judge Hauford Renders Decision Upholding Indian Agent.

Spokane, Wash., Aug. 10.—In the injunction suit of J. M. E. Gibson vs. Judge Hauford, Judge Hauford, of the United States circuit court, has handed down a decision upholding Agent Anderson in expelling Gibson from the Spokane Indian reservation.

Escaped Convict Arrested.

Guthrie, Okla., Aug. 10.—William Henry, who was sent to the Illinois penitentiary in 1901 to serve a 14-year sentence for forgery, and who escaped shortly after, was arrested in this city today. He married here a short time ago and quarreled with his wife, who informed the sheriff of Christian county, Illinois, of his whereabouts.

Danish Poet and Philologist Dead.

Borchsino, Aug. 10.—Jens Waldemar Borchsino, a Danish poet and philologist of wide reputation, died today at his home in this city, after a two days' illness.

Tekoa, Wash., Hotel Burned.

Spokane, Aug. 10.—The three-story brick hotel being built at Tekoa, Wash., by the Washington Lumber company, was destroyed by fire about 2 o'clock this morning. It is believed to have been the work of an incendiary. The loss is estimated at \$25,000, with insurance of about half that amount. The company states it will be rebuilt.

Hurricane Strikes Jamaica.

Kingstown, Jamaica, Aug. 10.—The tail of a hurricane moving over the Antilles struck the eastern end of the island of Jamaica today and did great damage to the banana-proper and to the United Fruit and the Jamaica Fruit companies. The full extent of the injury is still unknown. The hurricane appeared to be moving northward in the direction of Cuba.

Idaho West Point Cadet.

Moscow, Ida., Aug. 10.—Congressman Burton L. French has nominated Wentworth H. Moss of Payette to a West Point cadetship, with Aubrey Lawrence of Moscow and Louis Yeager of St. Anthony as alternates. The examination of the nominees will not occur until next spring.

Registrar of Idaho University.

Moscow, Ida., Aug. 10.—Announcement was made today that Wilfrid G. Harrison of Dawson City, N. W. T., has accepted the appointment as registrar of Idaho university, located here. Harrison expects to reach here about Sept. 1. Harrison is a graduate of Toronto university, and for the past three years has been secretary to the administrator of the Yukon district. Herbert J. Condon, who retired from the registrarship here for a similar position in the Washington university, leaves for Seattle tomorrow.

Addition of Chinese to Fair.

Washington, Aug. 10.—Sir Chen Tung Liang Cheng, the Chinese minister, today discussed with Acting Secy. Loomis details regarding the admission of the Chinese commissioner and suite to the world's fair at St. Louis. The arrangements made are not satisfactory to the Chinese government.

James Cowan Discharged.

New York, Aug. 10.—James Cowan, the senior member of the brokerage firm of Cowan & Co., who was arrested last week charged with having with him \$53,000 between March 10 and Sept. 1 of last year, given him by Mrs. Blanche Russell Smith of Milwaukee, was discharged today for lack of evidence. The assistant district attorney told the court that there was no case against Cowan, and the attorneys for Mrs. Smith withdrew the complaint.

Great Strike in Russia.

London, Aug. 11.—The Kiev (Russia) correspondent of the Times says: A leading Russian employer estimates that the strike in Russia affected half-million of men, and that the strength of the movement completely nonplussed the government authorities, especially Ven Fievhe, minister of the interior, whose attempt to play off labor against capital ended in his complete discomfiture.

August Gonzales Found.

Council Bluffs, Ia., Aug. 10.—August Gonzales, a Portuguese boy whose mother in California has made a sensational trip to locate him, was picked up in the Chicago & Northwestern freight yards in this city early today, having just arrived from Chicago, en route west.

He was taken to the police station, where he made known his identity and a wish to see his father.

When young Gonzales learned that transportation had been sent to him in Chicago he said he would wait in Council Bluffs for it. He said he will have no difficulty in identifying himself when he finds his mother, and believes she will recognize him. The boy says he has a number of wealthy relatives, one of whom, an uncle, lives in Honolulu.

Young Gonzales' father left quite a fortune, which, however, he did not come into possession until he is 21 years old. The police here expect to hear from his Oakland relatives in a short time.

Want Hooley Arrested.

London, Aug. 10.—Application was made to a magistrate in the Marlborough street police court today for a warrant for the arrest of Promoter E. T. Hooley on the charge of fraudulently and by false promises obtaining signatures to checks and bills of exchange amounting to over \$50,000. The magistrate reserved his decision. On Saturday Atty. Finlay instructed the director of public prosecution to investigate some of the transactions of Hooley in connection with the Sapphirum mine of Canada. Hooley's meteoric financial career and failure were the sensation of London a few years ago.

THE VALUE OF STATE PROPERTY

Will be Ten Millions Greater This Year Than Last.

MADE PUBLIC LAST NIGHT.

Totals on Real and Personal Property Will Not Be Compiled and Released Until December.

The state board of equalization completed last evening the tabulation of the assessed valuations of the state, and the result shows about \$10,000,000 added to the state's valuations. The returns on real and personal property will not be filed with the board until December, but it is estimated that the total will be above \$125,000,000, as against \$115,047,216 for the previous year. ALLEN'S MISDOINGS.

Methodist Aid Society Treasurer Was A Great Rascal.

Boston, Aug. 10.—About 20 Methodist ministers connected with the Preacher's Aid society held a secret meeting here today to consider the situation of the Preacher's Aid society, the former treasurer, Willard S. Allen, investigation of the case has disclosed evidence that for the last six or seven years Mr. Allen borrowed \$1,000 to \$2,000 for three days in March from former Alderman Charles Wilt of East Boston.

AN OKLAHOMA FEUD.

Result is Two Dead and a Third Seriously Wounded.

Guthrie, Okla., Aug. 10.—As a result of a neighborhood feud, William Cooper and his son, James Cooper, are dead, and Sam Barrett severely wounded. The parties were farmers living near Oleta, Woodward county, and had blood been excited for over a year. The parties met at a public well and in the altercation young Cooper shot Barrett in the face with a load of fire shot. Barrett then seized a shotgun and killed both the others. The murderer is in jail at Woodward.

MINERS GET INJUNCTION.

Protective League Restrained from Interfering.

Denver, Colo., Aug. 10.—A special to the News from Georgetown, Colo., says: Judge Frank Owens tonight issued an injunction against every member of the Citizens' Protective league, restraining them in any way from interfering with the operations of the Idaho Springs miners' union, who were driven out of the town just after the blowing up of the compressor of the Sun and Moon mine. Immediately after the issuance of the temporary restraining order attorneys representing the 18 miners and the Western Federation of Miners offered criminal complaints against the members of the Citizens' Protective league of Idaho Springs. Warrants against each of them were issued, and the sheriff was instructed to start tomorrow and arrest all of them that he could find and send them to jail at Georgetown to appear before Judge Owens.

Head Crushed by a Bridge.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 10.—A man believed to be looking for a job, was killed by the head of a bridge, which he was passing under. The man was found on top of a baggage car. In the man's clothing were found three cards made out by the Union Pacific Railroad company, payable in Nevada to A. C. Norris and a letter to Mrs. A. C. Norris, 112 East Main street, Stockton, Cal.

Knox to Confer with President.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Aug. 10.—Atty. Gen. Knox will confer tomorrow with the president. He will take lunch at Sagamore Hill, and probably will remain with the president most of the day. The president is expected to go over with him certain matters now pending in the department of justice, including that phase of the Littauer-Lyon glove contract, which was referred to the attorney-general.

The attention of the president tonight was directed to a circumstantial statement published today that Secy. Root expected to retire from the cabinet, to be succeeded by Gov. Taft of the Philippines. It can be said that there is no definite foundation for the story. The president, since the first intimations many months ago of Secy. Root's possible retirement, has hoped and still hopes that he will remain in the cabinet for a long time. He stated that the secretary will remain through the coming winter and probably a much longer time.

High Winds in Porto Rico.

San Juan, P. R., Aug. 10.—The people of the island are alarmed over the high winds, which are now blowing. Hurricane signals have been set by order of the weather bureau. Barbadoes reports that a hurricane is headed northwest.
