SPECIAL ELECTION FOR SCHOOL BONDS

Overcrowded Condition of High School Makes New Building Imperative.

ogden, Feb. 1 .-- A resolution Introdated last evening at the board of eduestion and unanimously adopted provides for the calling of a special election to be held at as early a date as pessible, to determine whether or not the city of Ogden will bond for the sum of \$90,000 to be used in connection with the \$25,000 now in the building fund, for the erection of a new high school building for Ogden. The present high school building is entirely inent high school building is entirely in-atequate to accommodate the large at-tendance of students, every room being evercrowded. The board of education has had this matter under considera-ion for a long time, but the large in-rease at the school from the midyear graduation has so crowded the build-ing that a new home for the school is a absolute necessity. Should the plans now under consideration be adopted it would give the board of education suf-ficient funds with which to erect a magnificent structure and then the pisent high school building could be used for a grammar grade school, thus for a grammar grade school, thus ing the crowded condition of the schools.

finance committee reported cash

The finance committee reported cash on hand, \$43,421.50, which is the largest amount the board of education has ever had on hand at one time. The enrollment of the city schools ex-ceeds the 5,000 mark now, being the largest attendance ever at the Ogden public schools. At the openinng of school for the second half of the year the enrollment was increased 198, of which number 82 were at the high school, Fifty-seven have been placed under quarantine since the 10th of Jan-nary.
