

SPECIAL ELECTION FOR SCHOOL BONDS

Overcrowded Condition of High School Makes New Building Imperative.

Ogden, Feb. 1.—A resolution introduced last evening at the board of education and unanimously adopted provides for the calling of a special election to be held at as early a date as possible, to determine whether or not the city of Ogden will bond for the sum of \$25,000 to be used in connection with the \$20,000 now in the building fund, for the erection of a new high school building for Ogden. The present high school building is entirely inadequate to accommodate the large attendance of students, every room being overcrowded. The board of education has had this matter under consideration for a long time, but the large increase at the school from the mid-year graduation has crowded the building to such a point that it is imperative that a new home for the school be erected as soon as possible. Should the plans now under consideration be adopted it would give the board of education sufficient funds to erect a new building of ample structure and then the present high school building could be used for a grammar grade school, thus relieving the crowded condition of the grade schools.

The finance committee reported cash on hand, \$42,421.50, which is the largest amount the board of education has ever had on hand at one time. The enrollment of the city schools exceeds the 5,000 mark now, being the largest attendance ever at the Ogden public schools. At the opening of school for the second half of the year the enrollment was increased 1,083. The number 52 were at the high school. Fifty-seven have been placed under quarantine since the 10th of January. The general health of the public is improving.

DAMAGE SUIT FILED.
A damage suit has been filed in the district court by the Nevada Silver Summit Mining company against E. Allen Mortimer to recover \$700 on one share of action and \$40 on another. It is alleged in the complaint that the first amount is due on a contract.

The highwaymen struck their victim repeatedly on the face and head, either with a club or a cane or a stick. One eye is closed and black and he presents sorry appearance.

Johnson, upon regaining consciousness, went to the roundhouse and made his complaint known. He was taken, and cared for until he could be taken to police headquarters. He could give no definite description of the hold-ups.

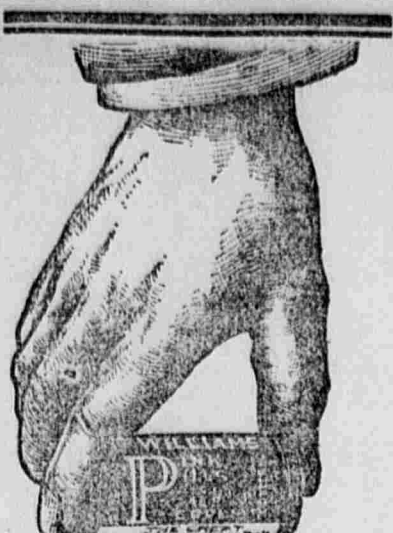

FIREMEN REMEMBERED.

James W. Cahoon Sends Check for \$100 to Volunteer Fire Fighters.
Murray, Feb. 1.—James W. Cahoon, in a communication to the city council, presented at its last session, expressed his appreciation in behalf of the good service of the fire department. Mr. Cahoon recently had a building destroyed by fire, and had it not been for the prompt response of the firemen, his loss would have been much greater, as he had other buildings adjoining which would also have been consumed only for the controlling of the flames. He accordingly presented to the council a check for \$100 to be given to the boys as an encouragement to continue in the service, as it is merely a volunteer department.

A petition from the fire department was read, which asked that a room in the new station be furnished and heated that a place of meeting might be provided. The matter was referred to the council and the council has decided to grant the request. However, the department was given the privilege of meeting in the north room of the city hall until accommodation can be provided at the station.

The road supervisor reported that he had condition of the sidewalk crossings, and asked that something be done to improve the conditions. The street committee will make an investigation and take orders to the road supervisor as to what shall be done.

The matter of connecting the city jail with the heating plant of the city hall was discussed at some length and it was finally decided to have the jail heated with a stove for the present.

The Utah Independent Telephone company put in a claim for \$224 for changing its poles on the corner of Murray street. The bill was not passed upon but was handed Councilman Lyon to communicate with the company, giving reason why the bill was not allowed.

The following bills were allowed: One thousand dollars was allowed as part payment for the town clock; \$330 to the architects; \$550 to Greene & Son for the new clock; \$100 to the Crager Iron Works for steel cages.

Bird, the city health officer, before being admitted in school. Thursday all the schools were visited and the teachers were given a visiting day.

Judge Gowans of the juvenile court, held court in Murray on Thursday morning, and three cases were disposed of. The board of education will meet this afternoon in special session to consider some important matters.

state and paid the sub-contractor \$125, desks and chairs upon which Sanderson's profits were 300 to 400 per cent. It was testified to day that the Sanderson bills were received at the department of grounds and buildings in March, 1906, and that they had been withdrawn the following day by Snyder, who afterward furnished the superintendent with a certified list.

Invoices had been kept in a private safe in Snyder's office, while invoices under the general schedule of 1904-5 were kept in the general filing cases of the department.

The commonwealth showed that the warrants for the pay of Sanderson's bills were turned over by the warrant clerk to Snyder, but that all other warrants were mailed direct by this clerk to the parties to whom they were issued. The defense brought out, on cross-examination, that Snyder received a receipt from the contractor before issuing him a warrant, and that the warrant clerk had access to the safe in Snyder's office in which Sanderson's bills were kept.

The commonwealth expects to close its case next Tuesday. The defense is not yet ready to say how long it will require to present its case. Both sides profess to be satisfied with the result so far. There will be no session of court tomorrow.

THE LOOTING OF A COMMONWEALTH.
Harrisburg, Pa., Jan. 1.—More than \$2,000,000 was paid to Contractor John H. Sanderson for furniture for the new state capitol before his bills began to be approved by the board of public accounts and the legislature. This was brought out at the trial of Sanderson, former State Treasurer Mathews, former Auditor General Snyder and Charles A. Diehl, former superintendent of grounds and buildings, in the Dauphin county court today. These bills were put in evidence by the commonwealth in spite of vigorous objections by the defense, which purpose of showing the system which the commonwealth alleges was pursued to defraud the state. The admission of the bills opens the way for the introduction of certain other papers and numerous articles of furniture to which reference is made in the indictments in the case now on trial.

The commonwealth brought down from the capitol and stored in the court house this afternoon a wagonload of furniture which it will offer in evidence
