The garment is made in two pieces, the long coat is sep arate from the short jacket, which is a modish prince chap with share collar and single breasted fronts, fastening invisibly beneath the large gu metal buttons and simulated buttonholes of brown taffeta. The sleeves of this coat are unusual, in that they are very large at the hand, and thoug the armhole is large there is very little fulness at the top of the sleev This has a high cuff effect given by the pleated strappings of brown taffet two in number, inside of which are set gun metal buttons and simulate buttonholes, and over this jacket is slipped the outer garment of three quarter length, semi-fitting in the back and loose in the front. READY FOR A SHORT TRIP

Very modish auto coats for dressy wear are those made of the natural color pongee with trimmings in a dark color matched by accessories in the same shade. Golden brown, that very popular shade of the season, is the color note of the accessories in this instance. The dress worn beneath this coat is of a golden brown mohair made in jumper style and worn with a lingerle waist of fine white batiste. The coat of pongee is three-quarters in length and hangs loose from the shoulders, fastening in front, single breasted, with three fancy metal buttons. There is a triple cape piped with brown taffets, and these are held in place over the shoulders with a pleating of the brown taffeta which gives a broad, square shoulder line. The back is treated in the same manner as the front, the pointed ends of these strappings fastening down with the large buttons. The shawl collar is inset with the brown taffeta, and the very full sleeves with the large mandarin armhole are gathered into a very high double pointed cuff piped with the brown and trimmed with buttons. The hands are encased in brown gloves, and the hat is a small affair known as the Collapsible Auto hat, for the reason that the wide back brim turns down perfectly over the back of the head, over which a brown striped grenadine veil is draped. This back brim when not turned down folds up against the crown, simply trimmed with a band of brown velvet and a plain gilt buckle.
