A CLEVER ADAPTATION OF THE JAPANESE IN AUTO COAT.

Quite the most novel adaptation of the Japanese idea in women's garments is noted in this pictured auto-coat of a novelty brown and white checked suiting. The garment is made in two pieces, the long coat is separate from the short jacket, which is a modish prince chap with shawl collar and single breasted fronts, fastening invisibly beneath the large gunmetal buttons and simulated buttonholes of brown taffeta. The sleeves of this coat are unusual, in that they are very large at the hand, and though the armhole is large there is very little fullness at the top of the sleeve. This has a high cuff effect given by the pleated strappings of brown taffeta two in number, inside of which are set gun metal buttons and simulated buttonholes, and over this jacket is slipped the outer garment of three quarter length, semi-fitting in the back and loose in the front. It does not come together over the bustline, the short jacket acting as a vest beneath these very loose fronts, trimmed with small pleatings of the plain brown silk. The neck, which is cut out rounding, is finished with a band of the pleated taffeta, as is also the large mandarin armhole. This outer coat, like the short prince chap, is lined throughout with white satin, and with it is worn a small brown felt toque trimmed with pheasant wing and to the back is pinned a brown taffeta silk hood, fastening with buttoned band around the neck. The accessories, such as gloves and shoes, are in the popular golden brown shade.

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
