Santa Barbara, Cal., April 10,-A streetear loaded with passengers returning to town from the Old Mission, ran off the track at the intersection of Garden and Mission streats today and five deaths have resulted. All of the dead were Santa Barbara people. Over 20 of the passengers were injured, many of them being frightfully mangled. Over haif of the injured had bones broken about the body and not a fer of them suffered serious fractures of the skull.

Irrigation in New Mexico.

Washington, April 10 .- The cepsus washington, April 10.—The cepsus bureau in a preliminary report on irrigation in New Mexico in 1902, shows 254,945 acres irrigated from all sources. The number of farms represented was 9,285, and the average cost per irrigated acre \$16.87. The 1,246 irrigation averages cost initially for main gation systems cost, initially for main canals and ditches and the necessary headgates, reservoirs, dams, pumping plants, etc., \$4,301,915. The entire length of main canals and ditches was 2,646 miles, an average length per system of over two miles.

Since 1899 the irrigated area has increased 51,052 acres, or 25 per cent, while the increase for the decade 1889-99 was over 122 per cent.

The emperor decided that Italy was wrong in not repressing the anti-Austria move-ment, and that Austria would be wrong if she tried to occupy Albania and thus conflict with Italian interests. There being no appeal from this decision Italy and Austria decided to complete the accord obtained through the meeting at Naples and Emperor William and King Victor Emmanuel, in toasts, contrary to other similar mani-



Bad Austro-Italian feeling, in which there is a risk of checking the work of diplomacy, has been aroused by an incident which occurred while the meet-ing between the ministers at Abbazia was taking place. The Italian steamer Molfetta, on arriving at Cattaro, a for-tified seaport in the Austrian province of Dalmatia, was approached by Austrian gendarmes, who said they wished to inspect the vessel. The captain of the Molfetta refused to allow the gen-darmes to come on board if they carried arms, and the soldiers threatened to attack the ship. The captain dis-played the Italian flag over the gangway, when the gendarmes were ordered to fire. Before the order could be carried into execution the captain yielded, in order to avoid bloodshed. The Italian government will bring the matter to the attention of the Austrian government and ask for an explanation.

A DOUBLE MURDERER.

Azel D. Galbraith Killed His Wife And Little Son.

Denver, April 9.-Azel D. Galbraith, formerly manager of the Topeka mine, in Russell gulch, Gilpin county, in jail nere on the charge of misappropriating the company's funds, this afternoon confessed to having murdered his wife and little son in his cabin in Russell gulch on March 9. A dispatch from Central City says the cabin has been entered and the two bodies found in hed with the bed clothing spread over them, giving the bed the appearance of being freshly made up. Both had been

shot in the head.

On April 1 Galbraith went to the cabin with Ernest Williams, engineer of the Brown Palace, to whom he owed money, and gave the latter enough of his hous-hold furniture to liquidate the debt. Williams stated tonight that on his visit there was no indication murder. Before his arrest Galbraith wrote several letters confessing his shortage to the Topeka company and attributing his downfall to drink.

WORK OF IRRIGATION. The Geological Survey Advocates

Great Caution.

Washington, April 10 .- The progress made in the irrigation work of the government is reviewed in a publication issued by the geological survey, which points out the necessity for great caution and conservatism in the expansion of the reclamation work. It says that the irrigation projects favorably re-ported in 1903, which included those on the Truckee river, in Nevada; on the Sait river in Arizona, on Milk river in Montana, on Sweetwater river in Wyo-ming, and on Gunnison river in Colothe Nevada and Arizona projects have been found feasible and construc-tion on the engineering works along the Truckee and Salt rivers has progressed

pected engineering difficulties as well as complications regarding water rights, so that progress is slow. It has been found necessary to modify the first plans in order to achieve early re-sults. The Wyoming project as first outlined has been found impracticable. A better reservoir site than that on the Sweetwater river, however, has been discovered on the North Platte, so that a large system of developing may be gineering difficulties are encountered in the Colorado project. The amount of arid lands thereby reclaimed is less, too, than was anticipated.

Russia Buying Ships.

New York, April 11.-The Russian government has not ceased its purchases of German transatlantic liners, according to a Herald dispatch from Berlin. The correspondent asserts that negotiations are spending for the pur-chase of a considerable number of German vessels. These are to be armed and together with the Smolensk and the Orel of the Black sea fleet, are to form a flying squadron of fast cruisers.
