I received a series on Forestry in the Deseret Evening News of January 3, 1895. I am somewhat interested in tree culture. When I was a young man, a year or two ago, I came from the country in England, and of course had no knowledge anything about trees growing. I arrived in Salt Lake City in the fall of 1894, I stopped to visit Ogden City till the winter of 1895, when I moved to Ogden, Weber County, Utah. In the year 1895, I read "Forest Young" all the parts that he wrote about soft wood timber trees, and said in his time will come when they will be used for fuel and other purposes. I often and then make up my mind to plant trees if ever I should have to move a place of land that I could call my own.

In the year 1895, I succeeded in obtaining forty acres of land; since that time part of it has gone to miners, so only little remains. I have an old, untrained, untrained, untrained, and some young trees when I carried on my farm from the river side, now being almost pine, may be available at the time. Years after, people were brought into the country to plant trees, and some of the young people went to work for a man and took them for pay. I was very careful of them, even planting the small slips one and three inches long. And then came the journey of time, so that from the first of my living land, I have put in practice the control of the result of God, with the view of getting the wood and seed for other purposes, so when I should get a place of land, I wanted to have a good quantity of trees for every article of wood. I should have enough of my own to last me perhaps all my life, and some for my children's use. I think it will prove so. I have been cutting my own wood a good many years, and have never had any trouble with trees, but when I have cut down a tree, I have cut something between two trees well through.

Do not reflect the ownership of the paper, because there is a growing demand for the timber, and those who are not here, therefore, for furniture a great deal of it is used. In fact there is not enough soft wood timber grown for present demands. While it will take long years and good soil, to grow the best hard wood, the soft wood can be raised in a short time, and bring in a good profit, for presentation. I find in my experience on shallow soil where the timber is within eight or ten inches of the surface, it is better to have a bed of sand, and then a layer of soft soil, and then cut until you reach the soft sand below, then fill up the half hole with good soil and plant the tree. Then put in the soil around the tree, and it will grow a tall, straight, well formed, and strong tree, and last longer than the one planted in hard soil. Most of my trees are shallow, and along the water ditches and land where I cannot grow anything else. Some say it does not grow, if so, it is not true, because most will hold out. I think it will grow, and will last longer than the ditches, better than any of the soft woods, the pineapple. Having grubbing or building the soil into the system, it will stand drouth better.

I grow my own wood, to every use on the farm, and a good deal more, so that if this people would take more notice and put in practice the command of our leaders, I find that the tree makes a place easier to sum up on account of the shade, cooling the hot climate, and a wind break in winter, losing the beauty and life of a place in summer.

THE COUNTY COURT.

Handsome Proceedings to be Instituted Against Treasurer Lytle.

The county court yesterday afternoon adopted a resolution instructing Attorney Whittemore to commence proceedings against Auditor William County Treasurer Lytle, to compel him to recognize the right of the court to create a special fund and to pay out all such amounts drawn thereon.

The court declined to take any action upon the suit of officers of the U. S. Court of Appeals, and of the State, County, and Auditor. Whittemore volunteered that it would be probably a remuneration of Mr. Whittemore's time in the office to which he was appointed by the court, and that the whole amount of his services would be paid.

The auditor was informed that he must decline to participate in the judgment of the court, and that the auditor's expenses would be paid.

The court will be in session again to-morrow evening.
