

disputants, and as there can be no dishonour in submitting to the laws, the National Council has deemed it the best guarantee of common justice and of future peace to abide by and maintain the existing laws upon the subject of slavery, as a final and conclusive settlement of that subject, in spirit and in substance.

And regarding it the highest duty to avow their opinions upon a subject so important, in distinct and unequivocal terms, it is hereby declared as the sense of this National Council, that Congress possesses no power, under the constitution, to legislate upon the subject of slavery in the States where it does or may exist, or to exclude any State general record, a number of the presidents have not as from admission into the Union bec use its constitution does or does not recognise the institution of slavery as a part of its social system; and expressly pretermitting 34th, and 35th quorums. any expression of opinion upon the power of Congress to establish or prohibit slavery in any Territory, it is the sense of the National Council that Congress ought not to legislate upon the subject of slavery within the Territories of the United States, and that any interference by Congress with slavery as it exists in the District of Columbia would be a violation of the spirit and intention of the compact by which the State of Maryland ceded the district to the United States, and a breach of the national faith. XIII .- The policy of the government of the United States, in its relations with foreign governments, is to exact justice from the strongest, and do justice to the Groceries, which we offer for sale as low as the contingweakest; restraining, by all the power of the government, all its citizons from interference with the internal concerns of nations with whom we are at reace.

XIV .- This National Council declares that all the principles of the Order shall be henceforward everywhere openly avowed; and that each member shall be at liberty to make known the existence of the Order, and the fact that he himself is a member; and it recommends that there be no concealment of the places of meeting of subordinate Councils.
