

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



OLD-FASHIONED PUFFING REVIVED.

The puffings forming the trimming of this tan chiffon voile gown with its large self-colored dots covering the entire surface, are corded with a single fine featherbone cording to relieve the too clinging characteristics of the material. Each puff is edged with lace braid through which pompadour ribbon is inserted. Lace and ribbon insertings trim the yoke and collar, while butterfly bows of ribbon, their ends fringed and knotted, are attached to the cuffs and bodice with tiny gold buckle buttons. The hat, made of reseda green straw, has a facing of green velvet, and is trimmed with a single red rose, with the plumes a shadowed effect in red and green, showing a red bony through the outer green flues.
