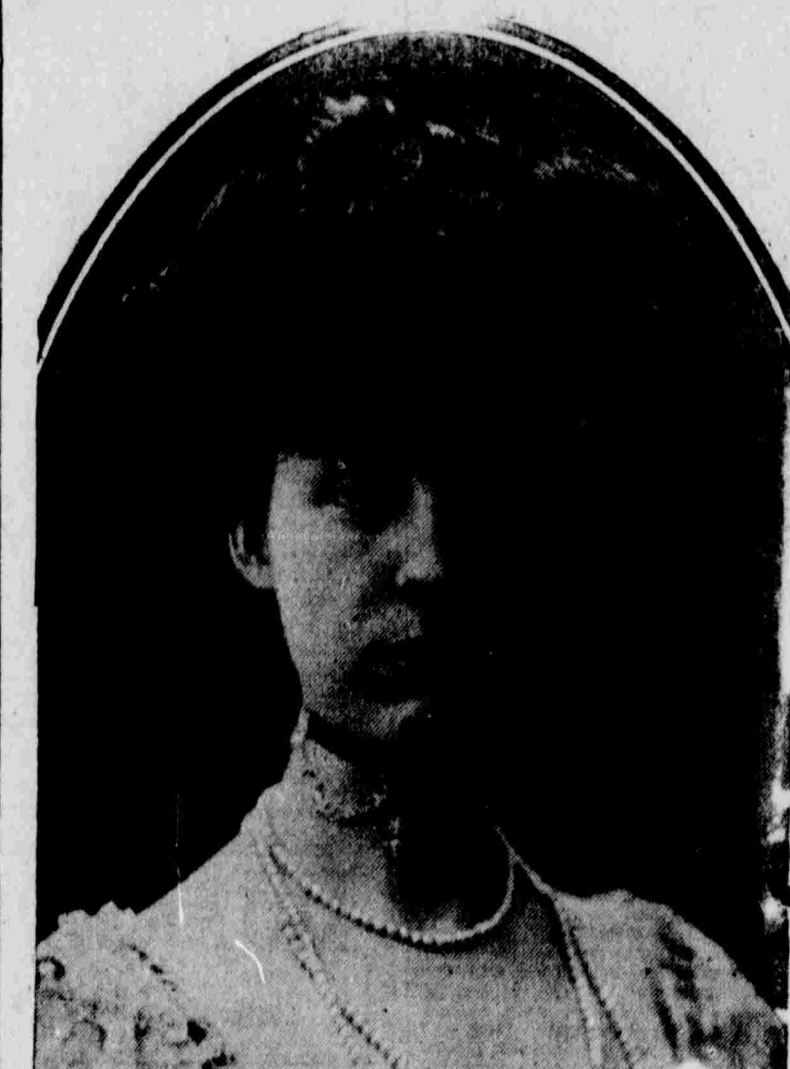

The puffs forming the trimming of this tan chiffon voile gown with its large self-colored dots covering the entire surface, are corded with a single fine featherbone cording to relieve the too clinging characteristics of the material.
