The boys set fire to a stack of corn fodder against the barn and but for the prompt arrival of the fire apparatus from station No. 4 the barn would have burned down.

It was pay day at Fort Douglas yesterday and it became more apparent that such was the case from early in the evening until midnight. It was the first pay the boys had received for two months and when they reached town last night they all felt wealthy. How they felt when they left at midnight none of them has offered to say.

The Master Horseholders' association is a new organization that has been established as an adjunct to the Journeymen Horseholders' union. A meeting was held last night and a temporary organization was effected consisting of A. M. Pondleton, president, and R. A. Fenton, secretary. A meeting will be held next Friday night to perfect the organization.

The reason for it is that a local tobacco plant had a large stock of a certain brand on hand which he could not dispose of, so he offered forty for five cents. The news spread down Plum Alley and in less than an hour the entire population of that savory section was lined up in front of the popular price tobacco store. GUNS AND CLUBS DO GOOD SERVICE

Officer Roberts Has His Hands Full With Turbulent Soldiers.

NEAT FOOTBALL TACKLE.

Carl West Joins in the Melee and Brings His Man Down in the Approved Style.

That there are certain soldiers at Fort Douglas who take special delight in creating a disturbance on Officer J. J. Roberts' beat every time they come to town is now an assured fact. More trouble occurred last night and before the turbulent element was finally quelled, "billy" clubs and pistols were pressed into service.

Five soldiers participated in the melee and two of them are locked securely in the city jail under the care of Officer Sol Kimball with the charge of fighting and resisting an officer looked against them. The other three succeeded in making their escape down state street by doing a lively "hot foot" to the police station.

The trouble started about 10 o'clock when W. A. Miller and A. C. Moss from an infantry company, engaged in a fight at the corner of State street and Second South. Officer Roberts heard the noise and rushed to the scene. He placed the men under arrest and started for the station. Here is where he made his mistake. As he passed Farrington's alley with his prisoners one of them broke and ran down the alley. Roberts released the remaining prisoner and started after the fleeing fugitive. Suddenly the fellow turned on the officer and aimed a blow at his solar plexus. Roberts ducked cleverly and returned the compliment with his club. Failing to stop the fellow in this manner he pulled out his trusty Colt's and fired a couple of shots into the shuffling scoundrel. The officer kept hotly after his man yelling for help at every jump and sometimes between jumps.

As the soldier neared the corner, Carl West, a young man employed at the "News," rushed at him and making a low tackle threw the fellow heavily to the ground. West is a football player.

"I got you, didn't I?" remarked West as he tussled with the soldier.

"I guess you did," he replied, as he kicked the soldier man violently on the hip, and just then the policeman fell on the man and marched him off to jail.

In the meantime Officer Barlow "nailed" Moss and joined Roberts. West was coming up the street with his prisoner.

Some one informed the officers that three soldiers were hiding in the alley back of the station and were going to attack them. Sure enough the men were there and made a rush for the limbs of the law but it happened that two of the burglars appeared at the same time and the soldiers beat a hasty retreat down the street.

VICIOUS ASSAULT.

Feud Between Students Leads to Disgraceful Consequences.

Funk, who resides at 311 West Third North, was on his way home when a young fellow, apparently about 18 years of age, approached and asked if he were a high school student. When Funk replied that he was two other toughs rushed upon him and struck him several times with their fists. He was then released but had gone but a short distance when the attack was renewed.

Word was sent to the police station and without delay with several officers were soon on the scene, but when they arrived the toughs were gone. It is said they jumped upon a passing wagon and rode rapidly down the street.

COMMERCE BLOCK SOLD.

P. H. Lannan Pays \$90,000 for Value of Piece of Property.

The Commerce block on the corner of Second South and West Temple streets has been purchased by P. H. Lannan from Henry W. Lawrence, Florence K. Woodruff and Frank Oddie, its former owners. It is understood that the consideration approximates \$90,000. The property has a 75 foot frontage on Second South street and a 155 foot frontage on West Temple. There is at present upon the property a three-story building 75x90 feet and a one-story building facing West Temple, and containing three store rooms with a 75 foot frontage. The principal tenants of the building are the Hill Drug company, the Hubbard Real Estate and Investment company, Hines Producers company, California book store, Frank Oddie, Rogers Cigar company and the Federation of Labor. It was stated today that Mr. Lannan has investment and among real estate dealers it is generally the opinion that the Commerce block property at \$90,000 is a very fine investment which will without much greater outlay net a good rate of interest on the money invested for many years to come. What Mr. Lannan intends to do with the property is not stated.

WATER CONTROVERSY.

City and Canal Companies Will Make Common Cause.

Salt Lake City and the canal companies of Salt Lake valley will make common cause to protect the rights of the people of this part of the state from the encroachments that are being made on the sources of supply of Utah lake in Utah and Washington counties. The mayor, city attorney, city engineer and Councilmen Robertson, Fernstrom, Bartleson and Whittemore, of the Council finance committee met at the Walker Bros. building yesterday afternoon to map out some plan of campaign for the successful stoppage of this growing evil. A resolution will probably be presented to the Council on Tuesday evening authorizing the Mayor to commence an action for the protection of the rights of the people of Salt Lake City. The sense of yesterday's meeting was that the city should join hands with the canal companies in bringing a joint suit against the misappropriators of the waters in controversy.

The Santa Fe is receiving 250 new oil cars, each having a capacity of 900 gallons. The Santa Fe road is also receiving 135 new engines.
