They Finished Almost Abreast, Making a Race Which Will Stand.

RECORDS GO GLIMMERING.

"Mac" Lowers World's Time on Three Mile Open Lap and Cereb, State Half Mile Amateur.

With a sensational finish to the five-mile motor paced race; two or three, what looked to be, bad tumbles, and good nerve riding all through, the bicycle fans at the Salt Palace last night had a most satisfying evening. Motor races like last night's affair aren't seen every day and the crowd realized it.

There was such a large bunch of prospective amateurs that the first event on the card had to be run in trial heats to qualify. This was the mile novice. The youngsters showed good headwork in their efforts to draw down the \$10 gold medal. Calvin rode himself into position as an amateur rider. The mile record was smashed in the final heat. Cereb went it in 22.5 seconds. It was in the three-mile open lap professional that McFarland showed

wonderful form, and in running around the bunch, he clipped two and a half seconds off the world's record, 3:55.14, held by Iver Lawson since 1905.

This was the race of the evening, and it was in this that the crowd showed the greatest enthusiasm.

Wright had no trouble at all in winning the amateur mile and out race. The rule of this race is that the last man over the tape on each lap must drop out, and the race narrowed down to Wright and Thomas.

SEATS SELLING HEAVILY

Biggest Crowd in History of Bicycling Anticipated at Monster Hopper Benefit Meet.

Reserved seats, grandstands and general admissions are selling fast before the benefit was fairly started, which it was first mentioned, to be truthful, a certain bicycle fan and all around live citizen telephoned for 25 reserved seats to be saved for him "whenever the benefit happened." This is out of one of numerous illustrations of the demand for the cardboards.

Bicycle riders and track athletes are buying reserved seats for their wives, families and friends for the riders are now doing their utmost to make the meet a racing and financial success, but are buying their own way into the track. Besides this the riders are paying their trainers' admissions. Not a pass will be good on benefit night for there isn't a person connected with the meet who isn't paying just as everyone will have to do. The races will be the best ever—the unlimited international pursuit is being discussed all over town and this one event would draw the largest crowd in the history of the sport against foreigners, to start on opposite sides of the track, sounds fine, and because the two bunches will combine the best riders in the world, the contest will be better than it sounds, even. The other events are away above gratifyingly good also.

GREAT RELAY RACE, THIS

Two Thousand Youngsters Will Carry One Thousand Miles, Carrying Greetings Between Cities.

New York, July 15.—Carrying a message of good-will from Mayor McCall to Mayor Busse of Chicago, the start of the longest cross-country relay race ever held will be made this morning from City Hall park. Nearly 2,000 youngsters, ranging in age from 15 to 20 years, will make up the team which will convey McCall's message to her sister city in the middle west. The boys are members of the Young Men's Christian association, and represent nearly every branch of the association between the two cities.

The message will be carried in a silver tube, which will be passed from one boy to another at the end of each relay. The youngsters will receive the message will run up Broadway half a mile and deliver it to another, who will point another distance. In this way the race will continue day and night until Chicago is reached.

The boys will be accompanied by automobile and will be taken to the starting point in the automobile also will be a relief runner or substitute, who will take the runner in case the latter becomes tired or injured. The boys will meet with any kind of an accident.

The scheme was first suggested by the boy secretary of the Chicago Central branch, A. A. Jameson, secretary of the twenty-third street branch in this city, who is in charge of the race in the east.

The direct mail route to Chicago is 90 miles. The route to be taken by the boys is estimated at 1,000 miles. There will be nearly 2,000 boys in the race, and it is estimated that it will be run on schedule time.

Wires Saltair from London.—Unexpected Victories Cause Rejoicing.

New York, July 15.—"In spite of all handicaps the Yankee team will win." This message received in New York from James H. Sullivan, American commissioner to the Olympic games at London, has done much to cheer up the members of the various athletic clubs, who feared that the method of drawing for places in heats in the various events would prove a great disadvantage to the Americans.

The victories of Melvin W. Sheppard, in the 150-meter dash, and John F. Flanagan, in the hammer throw at the Olympic games, were enthusiastically received in athletic circles in this city. Flanagan's victory was particularly well received, as a great Irisher was known to be pitted against the best distance runners in England, and it was almost conceded that the Britishers would win. THOMPSON MURDER.

Husband of Dead Woman Locked Up And Held as a Witness.

Chicago, July 15.—Edward Thompson, husband of Mrs. Frances Gilmore Thompson, the woman found strangled in her apartments at 1342 Michigan avenue recently, was locked up yesterday as a witness pending further investigation into the crime.

His detention was a surprise to Thompson, who came to Chicago from Minneapolis Monday night without coercion. It resulted from a decision of Inspector Wheeler, who conceded that Thompson was not telling the whole truth. The inspector dispatched Detective Egan to Minneapolis, Minn., to check up on the man's statements.

Thompson called upon Asst. Chief Schuetter and inquired into the details of the murder. He was referred to Inspector Wheeler. The inspector did not view the story related by Thompson in the same light as the assistant chief, who candidly states his belief that Thompson had no knowledge of the crime until he read about it in the newspapers.
