STAKE ACADMY COMMENCEMENT

Splendid Program given in New Lecture Hall—addresses To Grads.

PROGRAM AT H SCHOOL.

Names of Graduate Schools Commencement—graduates Of the Public schools.

Ogden, May 29.—The sixteenth commencement exercises of the Weber Stake Academy were held evening at the spacious new Jenny lecture hall, which is one of the largest and most conveniently arranged halls in the city. There were sent over 1,000 people to welcome graduates with rounds of applause they fled into the hall just previous the opening of the exercises. Decorations were purple and white; class colors.

The academy choir in the direction of Prof. Ballantyne opened the program with the chorus "The Call to Arms." Invocation was pronounced by President L. W. Stodd. The academy band, directed by Prof. Nichols, played the "Angra Cadet March."

The conferring of diplomas was done by Principal David O. May, who in well chosen words portra the real meaning of the word commencement and told the graduates the purpose of life, viz., to carry out purposes of the Master, to bless world and to give the world all that is man's power, to bless humanity, to shed sunshine of morality throughout the world.

Mr. Frank Chamberlain sang two solos.

Dr. John Henry Smith delivered an eloquent address to the graduates, telling of the possibilities of them in life after having laid a foundation in education and of living with it the principles of moral and love for God. Of all things advised honesty in all obligations, and called the attention of the graduands to the fact that there is no excuse without labor.

The academic band played serenade.

George C. Ensign gave oration, which had for its theme the spreading of sunshine in home and business houses everywhere.

A chorus, "Our W. S. A.", imposed by Miss Jennet McKay, was set to music by Prof. Joseph Ballantine was rendered by the choir.

PARK COMMISSION.

The Ogden Park commission recently appointed by the city council held a meeting last evening and elected John S. Lewis chairman.

It was decided to appoint one man to have full charge of all the city parks, but the appointment will not be made until the committee has been fully organized and in order to get a correct understanding of the city's finances the park commission and city council finance committee will meet at the city hall to decide on the salary to be paid the city park keeper.

One of the first pieces of work the commission will have done will be the painting of the northwest quarter of the city hall square in grass and flower beds.

WATER APPROPRIATION WONT DOWN.

The Utah Light & Railway company has had returned to it the application for permission to pump the waters of Ogden River into the pipe line, because the same is not correctly prepared, as to descriptions, etc., and it has therefore been sent back for the corrections to be made.

The local Merchants' association, which is composed of about 100 per cent of the local merchants at its meeting prepared a protest against the granting of the pumping franchise to the U. L. & R. Co. The other protests

came from the State Hardware for garden hose, tools and poultry netting, 152 State St.

that had been filed against the franchise being granted, have been returned to the senders, but will be held and resubmitted if the company should return its application.
