Purchase of Silver on Account of the Indian Government.

BUSINESS MEN DISCUSS MATTERS.

In Favor of Free Coinage.—Congressman George Barnes Suggests a Remedy.

WASHINGTON, July 6.—General A. J. Warner, president of the American Illustration League, said today: "We may look for purchases of silver on account of the Indian government at any time. In fact, that government has accepted a sort of blank law, except that it fixes the rate at 25 for converting copper into silver. If the mines of the West remain closed for any length of time silver will rise as a result of purchases by our government and us and the Indians."

WICHITA, KAN., July 6.—The speaker, leaving a path ranging from a quarter to three miles in width, and extending some twelve miles in the country. Some houses, barns and farms were swept away, crops ruined, and a large number of farm animals killed.

STOCK CITY, Ia., July 6.—Shortly after the Indians had left, a band of a dozen or fifteen Indians, which swept across the country to the southwest. The storm center appeared to be four miles west of town, where for many miles nothing is left standing and several houses are buried in the earth.

Two hundred and fifty Indians were instantly killed, and for ten and four hundred were dangerously hurt.

Charles Luttrell is also reported dead.

Thomas Ward and half his family were captured, and their horses were lost.

A telegram from Dodge City says:

"Five entire families were blown away,

"including the Indians who had

been taken captive. Mrs. Gossom was killed yesterday, and nothing is known of her husband.

"A house was blown away, and

the Indians were scattered.

"The government of Virginia, New South Wales and Queensland are

in discussion with some degree of success.

The state land commissioners ap-

pointed to the testimony in New

South Wales reported that after careful deliberation they were of the opinion

that the bill was not only unnecessary

but also injurious.

It is reported that at the town of

Pawnee in Custer county, is ready de-

stroyed; it is impossible to get details

as yet.
