I arrived in Virginia the 17th of March and was met at the Wytheville station by Elder M. F. Cowley, the gaspel of Christ. who kindly conveyed me to our friends in Bland Co., and in company with Elders Cowley, Thatcher, Pitkin and others I have since labored in Bland, Tazewell and other counties of this State, making one trip to North Carolina. During my labors here we have baptized 19 persons. We have the best of treatment, and plenty of friends, and numerous believers, but very few to obey. There seems to be a spirit of indifference and lethargy among the people. I am and have been in correspondence with most of the Elders of this mission, and a more faithful. energetic lot of young men it has never been my lot to associate with. The work in these Southern States is steadily on the increase, although since winter set in there seems to be somewhat of a check in its advance. ment, owing no doubt to the bitter cold weather that has prevailed most of the time. There has been some very heavy shows, with the mercury sometimes down to 20° below zero, and old Boreas coming up from the Ohio with a howl. This mission taken altogether, is much better organized and better understood than at any previous period The mission is spreading very rapidly into new and extensive fields of labor. This improvement has been brought about to a great extent through the energetic labors of President Morgan, together with the faithful exertions of all the elders of the mission. However we still labor under some disadvantages. The most of the elders sent out from last conference were young men of no previous experience as missionaries, with no acquaintance with the manners and customs of the Southern people,

while a portion of those already

here were in a similar condition.

This often compels two of this kind

to have to travel and labor together.

And where this happens, and they

this, as I have heard them express it, "takes all the wind out of us." And therefore equally disheartening. Some of our young elders will succeed in spite of all these drawbacks, being so humble and at the same time so determined, that the Lord can so abundantly bless them, that all obstacles to their success will give way. While there are others that with whom I had several skirmishes need the fostering care of an older head, to instruct and encourage them, taking the lead for a season till they find out they can walk in the strength of the Lord. EAST PORTERVILLE, January 26th, 1881.




