PLAGUE IN INDIA.

Figures Show that its Ravages Are Extensive.

London, March 23.—Replying to ques-tions in the house of commons tonight Mr. Broderick, secretary of state for India, said that the latest figures on the plague in India showed that for both the four weeks ending Feb. 28, in the Bombay presidency there were 13,475 deaths, and that for the four weeks ending March 11 in the rest of India there were 123,550 deaths. The total number of deaths from the plague in the Bombay presidency from Jan. 1 to Feb. 28, were 28,721 and in the rest of India from Jan. 1 to March 11, 318,178. Mr. Broderick said he had communi-ing to a remedy for this deplorable loss of life, and that it had been decided to send out a scientific expedition to in-vestigate the causes. GERMANY TO THE PORTE.

Vetoes Turkey's Proposal to Place Arms Order With France.

Paris, March 23.—The Temps today printed a dispatch from Constantinople announcing that the German ambasa-der has presented a note to the porte which is said to be a veto upon Tur-key placing eventual orders for arms in France, with menaces of serious con-sequences if the note is disregarded. The Ottoman cabinet, it is added, is seriously embarrassed and indigmant at the dictatorial conduct of Germany. The French ambasador continues the negotiations to secure a large arms or-der for France.

JIMINEZ PARTY BUSY.

San Domingo, Republic of Santo Do-mingo, March 23.—It is rumored that at a meeting of the Jiminez party it was resolved to telegraph to the followers of the former aspirant to the presidency at Monte Cristi to prepare for a strug-gle. The government is taking precautions to meet coming events. The situation, although at present quiet, is ritical.

The Belgian minister here has filed a strong protest against delay in the settlement of his government's finan-cial claims and a demand for prompt action by Santo Domingo in the matter. The minister will leave here to-morrow for Havana.

FOREIGN BONDHOLDERS.

London, March 23 .- The council of London, March 23.—The council of foreign bondholders today gave out the correspondence exchanged between Secy. Hay and Lord Avebury regard-ing Panama. Mr. Hay, in a letter to Lard Avebury, date Feb. 10, says the United States cannot withhold fur-ther payments to Panama until the settlement of Panama's share in the Colombian debt is arranged. Mr. Hay's reason was that the council of foreign bondholders are not clitzens of the United States and cannot claim the as-sistance of the American government. Lord Avebury in his reply to Mr. Hay. Lord Avebury in his reply to Mr. Hay, dated March 10, said he regretted that the American government was unable to comply with the council's request, Referring to President Roosevelt's recent message saying that the special reason for American Intervention in Santo Domingo was that foreign gov-Santo Domingo was that foreign gov-ornments were presenting their claims against the Dominican government, Lord Avebury says he had hoped Pres-ident Roosevelt would be ready to as-sist the holders of Colombian bonds, "whose claims are at least as good as those of the Santo Domingo bondhold-ers, and who have a right to special consideration in view of the prejudices from which they suffered in conse-quence of the secession of Panama from Colombia."

Hay if the United States will interfere to secure the recognition by Ponama of an equitable share in the Colombian debt if a request to that ef-fect is submitted by the governments of Great Britain and Holland, whose sub-jects are chiefly interested in the Co-lombian bonds.
