IT MADE SOME RECOVERY

Bull Operators Had the Market Well In Hand During the Afternoon, Experiencing Little Opposition.

New York, March 19 .- Southern Paclife was the center of interest in today's stock market, although surface indications during the early session gave little promise of a resumption of yesterday's late advance. The stock opened with moderately small efferings at a miximum decline of 14, but soon recovered and sold up to 684.


The movement was decidedly irregu-lar and at the end of the first haif hour the price dropped to 66 1-6. A few sales at 66 "seller 30 days," were record ed at a time when the regular price was 1 to 1% above that figure. Transactions were comparatively small though several 1,000 share b hands, while offerings of were quite common. At the end of the first hour Southern Pacific was selling fractionally under 07 and the balance of the list was duil,

Operations in Southern Pacific dwin-dled considerably and the stock was less of a factor in the market. The price was supported around 66% and it steadiness contributed to a much im proved tone in the market. Louisvill rose to 124 and this was followed by the bidding up of various other standard stocks, particularly St. Paul, Illinois Central, B. & C. and Northwestern, which advanced 1 each; Sault Ste Marie advanced 2 and Pacific Mail made a rapid rise of 314. The easier monetary conditions prevalent today and assur ances that a corner is not being at tempted in Southern Pacific had a ben eficial offect on the murket. At noor Southern Pacific was taken in hand by the bulls again and blocks of from 1,000 to 3.000 were rapidly bid up to 67%.
The bond market was quiet and ir-

regular. New paints of strength cropped out during the noon hour, substantial gains being made in Atchison, Rock Island, Canadian Pacific and People's Gas. General movements were toward a bigher level under the impetus of the renewed rise in Southern Pacific to 67%. When the stock later ran off a point so the general market became dull but maintained its undertone of

Bull operators had the market well in hand during the afternoon and exper-lenced little opposition in advancing prices effectively all around. Buying for the short account was on a large scale, the effective backing which numerous important stocks received caus ing some uneasiness to the short interest. Southern Pacific became quiet again and was "pegged" pretty well around 67. Union Pacific, St. Paul and Colorado Fuel advanced 2@2% and North American 3.
