LOCAL BRIEFS.

Miss O'Connor Sings—Miss Julia O'Connor, contralto of St. Leo's Catholic church in New York, sang in Vespers last evening in the Salt Lake cathedral.

Landenberger Funeral—The funeral of Charles Austen Landenberger will be held tomorrow at 11:30 a. m. from Dr. Landenberger's residence, 412 First avenue, with interment in Mt. Olivet.

Speaks at Prison—H. N. Trolles of Philadelphia addressed the Christian Endeavor society of the Utah state prison yesterday morning on matters of very practical interest, to which the members paid the closest attention.

Heppler Now Captain—C. M. Heppler was chosen on Saturday, captain of Company "E," First Infantry, at Richmond, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Capt. L. M. Morrison, who removed to Salt Lake. Major Kammerman presided at the election.

Hurt in Elevator—Wilbur W. Wilcox, aged 14, of 561 West Third South street, broke a thigh bone, and badly bruised his ankles when the elevator he was operating dropped 20 feet yesterday afternoon at the Jensen creamery. Wilcox was taken to St. Mark's hospital.

Tourist Dies in Hospital—Edward Mills of Denver, aged 19, died yesterday afternoon of peritonitis at Holy Cross hospital. He was en route to the Yellowstone country on a pleasure trip when he became ill. The body will be shipped to Denver by E. G. O'Donnell for interment.

Governor Loses Horses—A Shetland pony and a baby horse, belonging to Gov. John C. Cutler, and which the animals were presumably stolen from a field near the Salt Palace yesterday morning. A search was kept up all day yesterday, but no trace of the animals could be found. The governor offers a reward for their return.

Boys Were Too Rude—Complaints were made to the police yesterday about a crowd of boys, some of them old enough to know better, swimming in the Jordan near the bridge, which is crossed by the Saltair train. The youths garbed only in a pleasant smile were shocking to passengers on the train, and the police were asked to put a stop to this behavior. It was stopped.

Alta Saloonkeeper Arrested—An Alta saloonkeeper named Jerome Jaromirous is locked in the county jail on the charge of keeping a disorderly house. He was released yesterday, as fast as he could at Alta yesterday, and put a stop to it. He not only stopped the saloon, but brought the saloonkeeper to Salt Lake, and landed him in the county jail.

Resolution Is Approved—Mayor Bransford has attached his signature to a resolution passed by the city council last Thursday night for the curbing, guttering, and grading of paving extension No. 18, on North State street, including a portion of Capitol hill. It was intended to have the city council release the property owners from any liability for damages, but on a motion made by Mr. Hall, this feature was eliminated.

Lay Cornerstone Tomorrow—It was announced in the Presbyterian church yesterday that the cornerstone of the Women's building of Westminster college will be laid at 7:30 p. m., Tuesday, that hour being the cool of the day, when people are more likely to be out, and the building is at the corner of Thirteenth East and Eleventh South streets, reached by the Sugar House line of cars.

Raleigh Persuades Mayor—The resolution passed by the city council last week providing that more dirt should be dumped upon streets, and that already above the prescribed grade has been vetoed by Mayor Bransford. The resolution was introduced by Black, and was passed with only the dissenting vote of Mr. Hall. The street supervisor convinced the mayor that the order was too sweeping, inasmuch as it would require the city to fill up chuck holes to street grade, even though the street is already above grade.

Mayor Divides Job—Mayor Bransford has approved of the appointment made by the city council of Mr. Zellie Gifford as matron of the city jail, and sanctioned the contract made with Mrs. Mary Bero to feed the prisoners at nine cents a meal. It is doubtful if either can realize even five cents, as the first position draws only \$22.50 a month, and the contract for furnishing meals is at a very low figure. However, there could be a compromise effected between the two women, and each had backing in the ranks of the Woman's American club.

Pests Begin to Appear—The Salt Lake Horticultural society held a meeting Saturday at the City and County building. The principal matters discussed by the members were codlin moth, orange rust, and the alfalfa worm. Announcement was made that the moth had appeared in the county, and the only method of exterminating it was by a liberal spraying with kerosene, which is attacking blackberry bushes, except to uproot the bushes affected, and burn them. The larvae of the alfalfa worm are for the most part in evidence on the north bench.

REQUITED LOVE CAUSE OF SUICIDE

Thoams G. Hernandez Takes Morphine When His Proposal Is Rejected.

TOOK BIG DOSE OF POISON

Left a Note to Woman Who Spurned Him Bidding Goodbye and Good Luck.

Because Mrs. H. Golding who has charge of the Empire roominghouse at Murray refused to marry him, Thomas G. Hernandez, a cigar maker employed by the Monogram Cigar company, committed suicide yesterday afternoon.

at the home of A. Bretz, No. 1 Pleasant court, by taking a large dose of morphine. The man took the poison in the morning and his condition was not discovered until late in the afternoon, when repeated efforts were made to get the services of a physician. But before a doctor was finally summoned to the place Hernandez was dead.

The man became discouraged because he could not have his way in a love affair, and he addressed to Mrs. Golding the following note:

"Dear Goldie—I just came in my room, 8 a. m. I don't see you again good-bye, and good luck to you and the babies. You know the rest."

When Mrs. Golding was notified that he had killed himself she at first said she could not explain the reason. Later, however, she stated that Hernandez had been at her roominghouse all night and had proposed to her several times, but she rejected him. She said she had known the man for several years, but did not care for him enough to marry him. The letter was found in a long envelope which was stamped and addressed to Mrs. Golding. Chief of Police Pitt opened the letter and read the contents.

FRIENDS LEAVE HIM.

Mrs. Bretz, with whom Hernandez was rooming, stated that he came home about 8 o'clock in the morning and at once went to his room. She said he appeared to be cheerful, and that about 10:30 he was visited by two friends, they found the man in bed and he stated then that he was not feeling well. The friends then left the place.

In the afternoon it was discovered that Hernandez was suffering from poison. A package containing morphine and glass vials on the dresser. The man was unconscious. Several physicians were summoned and it is said that some of them replied that they did not want anything to do with a morphia case. About midnight Dr. Bahle reached the house but Hernandez was dead.

The dead man was a Spaniard and came here about 10 years ago. He was 34 years of age and leaves a father and mother in Jacksonville, Fla. Among his effects were found policies for \$250 of the Knights of Pythias and the Cigar makers' union, and a small box buried under the auspices of the latter organization.

None of the saloons sold any liquor, so far as known, but cigar stands in front of saloons were open and doing business in spite of orders issued by Chief Pitt to close them. Customers at drug stores who had in their possession "salted" cigars, giving the clerk a sly wink, went thirty yesterday. Most winning smiles and winks failed to move the clerks. They refused to sell.

Not only did dry Sunday in the city but those who went to the resorts in the hope of getting some of that amber fluid with froth on were doomed to disappointment. Saltair, Logans and Emigration canyon were as dry as a boneyard so far as intoxicants were concerned. They sold soda pop and lemonade. The saloons were all closely watched and Chief Pitt said that he never saw such a dry Sunday in Salt Lake as that of yesterday.
