

## L. E. DRISKELL IS ARRAIGNED

Confessed Murderer of Special  
Officer Riley Appears Be-  
fore Judge Lewis.

### ENTERS PLEA OF NOT GUILTY

Pleading Is Premature, However, and  
Is Immediately Withdrawn by  
Defendant's Attorney.

L. E. Driskell, charged with the murder of Special Policeman C. C. Riley, was arraigned at 10 o'clock this morning before Judge Thomas D. Lewis in the Third district court. When the information was read, Driskell listened attentively and before his attorney, P. T. Farnsworth Jr., could intercede, he answered "not guilty." Attorney Farnsworth had the plea withdrawn and asked to be given until 10 o'clock Monday morning to plead. He said that he wanted to read the complaint with the probable intention of entering a demurrer to it. Driskell has a cold steel grey eye and his features are marred by a long scar across the right cheek. His countenance betrays no emotion when he was brought into court and the proceedings in his case commenced. Driskell made a confession, according to the police that he shot and killed Officer Riley on the night of Oct. 4, 1909 after he had been arrested for robbing Knowlton Nebeker of an overcoat and some money.

### LIKES SALT LAKE.

Judge Page Morris Says He Will Stay  
Here as Long as Possible.

Judge Page Morris, sitting on the federal bench, this morning during the setting of future cases joyfully remarked that he was going to stay in Salt Lake as long as he could. "I will be here until Dec. 30, if you gentlemen can find enough for me to do," he said to about a score of the members of the local bar. "I like Salt Lake and I like the people here, particularly the members of the bar with whom I have come in contact in the court room and as private citizens."

### WIDOW ASKS \$20,000 DAMAGES.

Katrina Perkovich, the widow of George Perkovich, a laborer, who lost his life on January 5, 1909, while working for the Tintic Mining & Development company, wants damages in the amount of \$20,000, the case being on trial before Judge Page Morris in the United States court today. The dead man was loading cars from a bin when, it is charged, a runaway car came down the incline and inflicted injuries which resulted in his death.

### CHARGED WITH PERJURY.

Richard Price, Jr., the last of the eight men who were indicted by the recent federal grand jury was placed under arrest Thursday night by Lucian H. Smyth chief deputy to United States Marshal James A. Anderson and Wales, Sanpete county. He was brought to Salt Lake and is being held in \$1,000. Price, who is a farmer living near Wales, is charged with perjury in making proof on land in Sanpete county.

### STATE CASES CALLED.

E. G. Morrison was given his preliminary hearing in police court before Judge Bowman this morning on a charge of having burglarized the Salt Lake Tailoring company's store, at 65 west Second South street, on the night of Nov. 1. It was alleged that he had crawled through a window, but it developed that the window was unlocked. Morrison vigorously denied his guilt. It is claimed that he was found this next day trying to sell a pair of trousers.

They were married in American Fork, Utah, on Dec. 6, 1900, and have a family of five children. Since 1902, Mrs. Grantham says that her husband has been intemperate and has struck her a number of times when he came home under the influence of liquor. She asks the custody of her children and suitable alimony.

### SEEK LIEN FORECLOSURE.

The case of Silas F. Johnson and Reuben V. Lockwood who charge Thomson Goddard, Steven O. Snyder, John L. Beckett, J. D. Kenworthy and Shand Smith with violating their contract to pay \$21,000 for a group of mining claims known as the Atlas group, was transferred Thursday from the Fifth district court to the Third district court. It is alleged in the complaint that there is still \$9,000 due and the plaintiffs ask that their lien be foreclosed on the property.

## SHE SHOT MAN WHO WAS BEATING HER

So Says Mrs. M. E. Dudley, Held for  
Outcome of Injuries of  
Monroe Miller.

Mrs. M. E. Dudley shot and probably fatally wounded Monroe L. Miller in her home at 143 east Third South street this morning at 12:30 o'clock, because he was beating her, she says. Both are colored. Monroe was examined by Dr. F. B. Steele, the police surgeon, and ordered to be taken to St. Mark's hospital. Mrs. Dudley was lodged in the city prison, where she will be held pending the outcome of Miller's wounds. Little hope is held out for his recovery. In the event of his death, a charge of murder will be placed against the woman.

Patrolman Patterson happened to be near the house when the shots were fired, and he captured Mrs. Dudley as she ran out of the front door with the revolver in her hand. Patterson found Miller lying in a great pool of blood on the floor.

Miller and Mrs. Dudley, it is said, have been friendly, but recently have had numerous quarrels. Thursday night they had a bitter row, and Miller attacked the woman, knocking her down several times with his fists. She shot him in self defense, she avers.

Mrs. W. I. Mitchell, a daughter of Mrs. Dudley, saw the shooting, and claims that Miller had been beating her mother. She was held by the authorities.

Mrs. Dudley shot Miller twice, the first bullet penetrating the body from the left to the right side and passing through the intestines, while the second bullet struck him in the back, between the shoulder blades, passed through the spinal column and lodged in the chest. An X-ray examination will be made to locate the exact position of the bullet.

Mrs. Dudley's attorney, Lawrence Marsh, colored, stated that he would probably recover, and that the wounded man had refused to prosecute the woman who had shot him. Marsh asked Judge Bowman in police court to order Mrs. Dudley's release on \$100 bail. It developed immediately, however, that Chief of Police Barlow refused to release Mrs. Dudley on \$100 bail, when Atty. Marsh asked that his client be turned loose. A hurried consultation was held by the authorities, and inasmuch as no complaint had been filed, the woman could not be released anyway, and Chief Barlow said that he would hold Mrs. Dudley until it was known whether Miller would die as the result of the wounds which she inflicted.

According to Atty. Marsh, Miller had said that the shooting was accidental and that he did not want Mrs. Dudley held responsible in case he should die.

### JOSEPH SANDS DIES.

Waiter Who Identified Alleged Robber Victim of Typhoid Pneumonia.

Joseph Sands, headwaiter at Finch's cafe, died in St. Mark's hospital from typhoid pneumonia this morning at 9:15 o'clock. Sands was the man who identified John Furey as the holdup who robbed the safe early on the morning of Nov. 12, and took \$12.35 from the cash register, while his "pal" lined the other waiters and the cook up the morning of Nov. 12 at the point of a gun, in the kitchen. The death of Sands materially weakens the case against Furey, as his identification by the waiter was practically the only evidence that the police have been able to get against him. Furey was released from the state prison, where he had served a sentence for robbery, Nov. 6. He stoutly maintains his innocence. Sands' identification of Furey was made in an unusual way. The detectives brought Sands to the police station and had him look through a "gallery" of several hundred criminals. Sands finally chose Furey's prison picture as that of the robber who had held up the cafe employees. Furey was stated at the time of the holdup that the robber who had rifled the cash register in front, came back into the kitchen and, taking off his mask, shoved his face up close

Chief of Detectives George Sheets stated this noon that Sands was not the only man who had identified Furey as the robber who held up Finch's cafe, and that a hackman, whose name is not given, but who is known by the nickname of English, had also identified him.

Joseph Sands was born Nov. 12, 1869, in Santa Fe, Cal. He came here 18 years ago and engaged in the restaurant business. He married Miss Ida M. Reing in 1895, and they had one child, Florence May, six years old. He is survived by his widow, daughter, and a sister who lives in California.

Mr. Sands was a member of the Elks, Knights of Pythias and Restaurant Men's union. The funeral will be held from K. of P. hall, Sunday afternoon, at 2 o'clock. Interment will be in city cemetery. Mr. Sands was well known in this city. He had a lease on the Lagoon restaurant, which he ran during the last three summers.
