

Breaking Ground for a Tabernacle.

CITY BOUNTIFUL, Feb. 13, 1857.

EDITOR DESERET NEWS:

Presuming it may not be uninteresting, we beg to acquaint you of our late movement in preparing to erect a tabernacle wherein the citizens of Bountiful may conveniently meet to worship God.

On Thursday, Feb. 13, the citizens turned out for the purpose of dedicating and breaking the ground preparatory to erecting a house 80 feet long by 40 feet wide.

At 9 a.m., formed in the following order:—

1. Brass band, preceded by the marshal of the day.

2. Captain William H. Walton, company of mounted rifles; flag motto, "Ever prepared, not to be scared."

3. Lorenzo Snow, of the Twelve, and missionaries carrying the Books of Mormon, Doctrine and Covenants and Bible, preceded by a banner of blue and gold; motto, "Zion's bulwarks."

4. The bishop and his counselors bearing the city records, preceded by the ward flag; motto, "Industry."

5. Visiting bishop and the master builder with the draft of house.

6. 24 Fathers in Israel, preceded by a banner of blue and gold; motto, "Wisdom."

7. 24 Mothers in Israel.

8. 24 Boys with banner; motto, "Mormon boys."

9. 24 Girls with banner blue and gold; motto, "Mountain blossoms."

10. 24 Young Men, banner blue and gold; motto, "By truth we conquer."

11. 24 Young Women, banner blue and gold; motto, "Purity and virtue."

12. The Citizens and their families, preceded by a banner; motto, "Hail to our martyred Prophet."

13. Capt. James Fackrell's company of infantry.

The procession marched to the ground with banners unfurled, and music.

Arrived on the ground, the company formed a hollow square around the building site, when Prest. Snow offered the dedication prayer, after which he delivered an appropriate address and proceeded with the bishop to break the south east corner of the ground.

Procession re-formed; counter marched; choir singing, "Lo, the gentle chain is broken." Marched to the Bishop's residence; after being complimented by the Marshal of the day and the Bishop, the assembly was dismissed.

A splendid dinner was provided by the Bishop to the distinguished visitors, the Ward authorities, the officers of the day, the band and their ladies. After dinner the company was agreeably entertained by the performances of the band.

The day was pleasant, and altogether propitious for the occasion; a good spirit and good order was manifest.—Yours truly, in the new and everlasting covenant,

CURIOUS DISCOVERY.—The deep diggings in the mountains of California are daily bringing to light interesting and astonishing facts, which tend to shroud the early history of this portion of the continent in the deepest mystery, and tend to the conviction that it was once peopled by another race of men, highly advanced in civilization. In the shaft of J. L. Duncan & Co., on the ridge between the Middle and South Yubas, in this county, at the distance of one hundred and seventy-six feet below the surface of the ground, was found, on the 26th of December, a curiously fashioned glass bottle or jar, which was dug up in hard cement. After removing the redish coating, an eighth of an inch thick, which attached to the outside, and thoroughly washing it, it was found to be of a light color, and perfectly transparent. It somewhat resembled a small-sized pickle jar, but has a longer neck and a flat bottom. It must have been lying in the silent spot where it was found for many hundred years. —[Nevada Journal.]

THE MURDEROUS RIOTS IN BALTIMORE.—The election riots in Baltimore on the 4th of Nov. were as serious as many a regular battle. The Republican reports that twenty-five persons were either killed or mortally wounded, twenty-seven dangerously, fifty-one severely, and thirty-four slightly wounded, making a total of one hundred and thirty-seven persons injured in the riots at this election. —[Washington Union.]
