

LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

THEATRE.—Madame Mathia Scheller re-appeared on the boards of our Theatre last evening, and she was received enthusiastically. She is deservedly a general favorite with the public. There is a sweetness and chasteness about her impersonations which, aside from her talented delineations and exquisite singing, win every heart. The tones of her voice, her looks and gestures, all give evidence that she is a cultivated, chaste lady, an honor to the profession which she adorns. In the two characters which she represented last evening, she played charmingly and sang with her accustomed sweetness. She was well sustained by the stock company.

THE UTAH CENTRAL RAILROAD.—President Brigham Young returned from his trip to Ogden last evening, accompanied by President Geo. A. Smith, W. Jennings, Esq., Vice President of the U. C. R. R., and F. Little, Esq., Superintendent of Construction. While in that city they had the pleasure of witnessing the first locomotive run along the track of the Utah Central Railroad and over the Weber river bridge. The train consisted of the locomotive, followed by its wake fifteen cars, loaded with iron and ties. The track is now laid about three miles this side of the Weber river, over the most difficult portion of the road, and is progressing at the rate of about half a mile a day. John W. Young, Esq., assisted by seventy men, is laying the rails, and as a sample of what they are doing, he telegraphed to President Young last evening, to the effect that yesterday they laid 2,500 feet of rail besides loading and unloading twenty car loads of iron and ties. Twenty more car loads were to be brought to the front by the locomotive this morning.

All appears favorable for the early completion of the track, and we know of no reason why the snort of the iron horse should not be heard in the streets of this city before 1893 gives way to 1870.

President Young and the other gentlemen who returned with him, speak with much pleasure of the gratification the sight of the first locomotive on the first road built and owned by the people of this Territory gave them, which argued no much for the future wellbeing of Israel.

THAT FOX.—John W. Young, Esq., and several other gentlemen, have undertaken to establish a manerie in this city, to be more especially devoted to the native animals of this section of the continent. One of these animals, a silver grey fox, lately escaped from the residence of Mr. Young, and has not yet been recovered. It is a valuable animal, and it is possible another of the same kind cannot be obtained; should any of our citizens find it, and will return it, they will confer a favor on Mr. Young.
