

TAFT WILL FIGHT TO THE LAST DITCH

In Defense of Administration's Record on the Recent Tariff Legislation.

READY TO MEET WESTERNERS

Beverly, Mass., Aug. 23.—It was intimated at President Taft's cottage today that the administration was prepared to defend to the last ditch its record on the recent tariff legislation. This was unofficially stated in connection with an announcement that Senator Aldrich would be here Thursday. The chairman of the senate finance committee, it was said, would discuss with the president the report of the money commission, and other matters. These "other matters" are supposed to include a talk on the tariff.

If the western opponents of the new tariff bill expect silence from the president, they are disappointed. He hopes to find most of them before he leaves for the west, as well as members of the so-called foreign tariff commission.

BLEACHED FLOUR.

Request of Manufacturers That No More Seizures be Made, Refused.

Washington, Aug. 23.—Requests of manufacturers of bleached flour that no further seizures of bleached flour be made until a test case should have been decided were refused today, following a conference between Wade Ellis, acting attorney general, and Dr. H. F. Dunlop of the pure food board of the agricultural department. The food experts of the department

some time ago decided that bleached flour was in violation of the pure food laws, not so much on the ground of impurity, but because of alleged misbranding, and the agents of the department were instructed to make seizures of the flour.

Counsel for the millers have been seeking to have the seizures discontinued until a test case can be made and decided. Today it was determined that the seizures will be continued without regard to a test case.

It is not known what percentage of flour now consumed in the country is put through the bleaching methods. Two processes of bleaching, one by electricity and the other a chemical process, are used almost altogether. The millers of the northwest stopped bleaching flour on Feb. 1. The hard wheat of the northwest mixes a white flour without bleaching, while the soft wheat of the middle west does not produce such a white color when milled.

PRISONER BEATEN TO DEATH IN HIS CELL

Red Bluff, Calif., Aug. 23.—John McIntosh was beaten to death in the city jail here yesterday and Jerry Desmond sustained a fractured skull and other injuries that probably will result in his death. John Lowery, also known as John Sullivan, who occupied the same cell, is held to await the findings of a coroner's inquest now in progress.

During the evening the jailer heard cries of "murder" and screams of rage coming from the cell, but paid no attention until some time later, when he opened the door to find McIntosh dead on the floor and Desmond bleeding from the mouth and ears.

Lowery declared that he knew nothing of the tragedy.

TRIAL OF CRABTREE FOR KILLING CAPT. RAYMOND

Omaha, Aug. 23.—The trial by general court-martial of Capt. Lila Crabtree of Troop B, second United States Cavalry, on the charge of killing his company commander, Capt. John C. Raymond, at Fort Des Moines, June 19, began at Fort Crook, near this city today.

The plea of the defense is insanity. In connection with the murder charge Crabtree is called to answer to the charge of shooting with deadly intent, First Sgt. Washburn and Corp. Such at the time Capt. Raymond was killed.

The testimony brought out that Corp. Crabtree with Privates Faber and Daroff went to Des Moines June 12, the day before the shooting, planned the capture of Capt. Raymond. Crabtree had asked Corp. Such for a pass good until 7 o'clock the night of June 13. Through some mistake the pass was made to expire at 7 o'clock a. m. Crabtree did not notice the difference and overstayed his leave. For this Capt. Raymond reprimanded him but on Crabtree's explanation the captain said he would let it go. Crabtree then asked to be relieved of his duties as corporal, saying he did not think he was capable of discharging them. Capt. Raymond said he would consider the matter. A moment later Crabtree drew a

pistol and began shooting at the officer. The first shot went wild. He then turned the weapon upon Corp. Such and First Sgt. Washburn.

RETURNING PROSPERITY CUTS DOWN RECRUITING

Washington, Aug. 23.—Returning prosperity is having effect on recruiting men for the United States army, making it more difficult to keep up the standard established during the time following the panic of 1907 when splendid material was available from the ranks of the unemployed. The authorized strength of the army is 84,500 men exclusive of the hospital corps which number 3,500 men. It will not be a hard matter, therefore, to reduce the size of the standing army in accordance with President Taft's wishes. Possibly the cause for this reduction is the difficulty of obtaining good men but the real reason is one of economy. Every man reduced means a saving of \$1,000 a year and if the reduction proposed reaches 8,000 men by July 1 next, the total annual saving will amount to \$8,000,000 a year.

LONE STAR STATE.

Hetty Green's Son Makes Texas Day

One to be Remembered.

New York, Aug. 24.—It was Texas day on Broadway and the white light display was long remembered the occasion. Edward R. Green, son of Mrs. Hetty Green, issued many interviews, in which he predicted that Texas will exceed all states in the increase in population when the result of the coming census is known.

His efforts to boom the Lone Star state were ably assisted by Arthur P. Sutter, immigration agent of the Rock Island system, who attracted much attention by the exhibit of wheat grown by what is known as the "farming method," which is to plow deep in seeking settlers for his state, Mr. Sutter said.

"Texas has lower taxes than any other state; more coal and oil than Pennsylvania; more iron than Alabama; more granite than New Hampshire; more lignite and coal than all Europe; more timber land than Michigan; more fruit land than California; more corn land than Illinois; more cotton land than any other state; more miles of railroad than any other state; and is building more every year than any other state."

PREHISTORIC CIVILIZATION IN ALEUTIAN ISLANDS

Port Townsend, Wash., Aug. 24.—News is brought by the United States revenue cutter Tahoma, which reached Puget Sound today after steaming around the world from Baltimore, that a party of ethnologists headed by Dr. Waldemar Yochelson, a noted Russian explorer, and encountered at the island of Attu in the Aleutian archipelago, have discovered relics and skeletons that would establish the record of population of northwestern North America during prehistoric ages.

In a statement to Capt. Quinn of the Tahoma, Dr. Yochelson told of differences from the present civilization on the islands which the relics uncovered would establish completely a belief that thousands of years ago the highest type of humanity existing in the new world existed in the north. The search of the Yochelson party is directed by the Royal Geographical Society and will be continued several years before a formal report is made in St. Petersburg.

Report is also brought that the Bogoslov islands in Bering sea, the field of numerous changes through volcanic eruptions, are now undergoing further marked configurations.
