LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

No Business.—The police court for several days has had nothing to do.

Increasing.—The number of papers that "spell by means of," "hymenial," is alarming on the increase.

Lewis' Lecture.—Remember "Pets and Hobbies," by Professor T. B. Lewis, in the 17th Ward tomorrow evening.

Still Closed.—The snow blockade on the W. and J. V. Railroad, between Sandy and Alta, still continues. A telegram from Superintendent Young, at Alta, states that it will probably be lifted by Thursday, the 18th, and the running of trains renewed.

Heavy Lumber Importation.—The Sierra Nevada Lumber Company have received, within the last two or three days about 40 car loads of lumber: 20 one day, the next, and 20 the following day. Such heavy shipments of lumber into our territory are unprecedented.

Panorama.—The Panorama Panorama was exhibited last evening, in the 6th Ward School house, before a large and attentive audience, and was a complete success. It will exhibit in the 11th Ward, this evening, in the 7th Ward tomorrow evening, and in the 19th Ward on Friday.

A Live Reporter.—We had a pleasant call this morning from Brother James Dand, the genial and efficient superintendent of the Provo Factory, who is up to this city on business. He reports the institution over which he presides in a flourishing condition, and increasing efforts will accomplish it, hopes to yet make it among the leading industries of the West, as it is now of Utah Territory. Some time, between the 1st and 10th of next month, he anticipates making a trip to the East for the purpose of transacting business for the Company, visiting the principal manufacturing cities of the nation, and collecting general useful information to assist him in his vocation. We wish him a pleasant journey, a profitable stay, and a safe return home.

Killed in a Mine.—On Saturday

morning, about 10 o'clock, an accident occurred in the Stewart mine, No. 1. Bingham Canon, by which Mr. Fred Gilmer, a miner, met a violent death. The circumstances are as follows: Mr. Gilmer was working in the main 'car tunnel, some distance beyond the mouth of a side drift, in which several other workmen were blasting. Having applied the fuse and 'catted it, these latter separated in various directions to avoid the explosion, not, however, before one of them had gone, as usual, to the mouth of the drift and shouted "Fire" as a warning to all who might chance to pass along the main tunnel or enter the drift. It is supposed that Mr. Gilmer either understood the call of "fire," or a call for "Fred," (himself) or that he went back of his own accord, leaving his gloves and tools, and entered the drift. After traversing a few feet, he saw the lighted fuse, splitting fire, and immediately turned to retreat, but had gone but a few feet, when the blast went off, and a fragment striking him on the back of the head, made a deep wound in the skull. He was taken up by his mates, and after lying about four hours expired about 2 o'clock in the afternoon. The remains were brought to this city Sunday evening, where they awaited the arrival of Mr. Jack Gilmer, brother to the deceased, who was on his way from the Black Hills, and arrived by last evening's train, previous to their final disposition.

No blame can attach to either the owners or the employees of the mine, as it is evident the accident is one which could not have been better guarded against.

The above was unavoidably crowded out of our columns, last evening. The funeral was held today, from the residence of Mr. J. T. Gilmer, who arrived in town last night. The remains were interred in Mt. Olivet Cemetery.
