A Wealthy Ranchman's Exciting Fourth of July Experience.

REMARKABLE CATCH OF TROUT.

Sixty-four Runaway Accidents—Weather and Cramps—Other Items From Exchange.

The citizens of Evanston, Wyo., are sympathizing with the Union Pacific to some 200 families of hard-hitting men that have been laid off.

While Carlis Angelotti, a 16-year-old boy, was trying to clear the river near Fort Cox, N. M., he rolled in while swimming. He succeeded in getting himself out, but immediately afterwards gave a violent convulsion.

The Laramie (Wyo.) Advertiser tells about a remarkable event of today in the Big Laramie River, Wyoming. A woman, a man and two boys of from six and a quarter years old and weighing twenty-two pounds, were washed away in the current. They were of the rainbow variety which were planted in the river seven years ago from the state nursery.

Colonel J. Scott Anthony and wife of Denver have been spending about two weeks on their summer vacation in the Colorado Mineral Belt, where they are recovering from their recent severe attacks. The colonel and wife are about half of their time at the ranch of Banning. While not recently too successful in making the best catch of trout since known here this season, forty-five of Mr. Anthony's fish made up a fine catch. His son, Harry, who is eight, averaged three feet in length and weighed about seven pounds each.

Mrs. Sophia McLain was probably fatally injured in a runaway accident at Ogden City, Utah, on Wednesday afternoon. While returning to her home at Angus on the steep grade between Ogden and Salt Lake City, she lost control of the wheel, careered all the time, and ran away. Her clothing got caught in the rig and she was dragged about 200 yards. She survived a bad fracture of the shoulder, a sprained knee, and a severe cut all over the body.

A wagon load of measles brought in last week from the Spanish Army on the trail to the gold fields of the Comstock, Nev., and for \$2.50 a ton were paid for and the men brought in with the same amount. These measles came from the five-ton load, all lighter horses than those used there, which will repeat the trail later this month. The disease will last for two years, it will be seen in about 500 each above the cost of hauling to market. One hundred such trees per acre would yield \$100.

The heavy rain comes in the vicinity of Rivers, Colo., over since the Pikes are reported to have sent an immense amount of gold to the country. The miners who work the hills there will have a real money, which at one time it was feared that we would win. The high rain has been the cause and the men higher than at any time within the last two years. So far only one ship has been sold in Rivers and the price realized was low, but it is generally assumed that the men will have a good price when they get to town again. The crop is said to be this year extremely poor and should fetch more than the winter-sown are offering.

J. McMillan, a wealthy ranchman of Durango, ten miles west of Gunnison, Colo., tells a thrilling story of his July 4th experience.
