Brick Yard .- Mr. Edward Brain's though the aged lady, who is about 70 brick yard is fast assuming the proportions of an extensive and important industry. It is situated in the Twenty-first Ward and embraces about she resides. eight acres of land suitable for the

manufacture of brick. A machine, which is run by a six-horse-power engine, turns out about 50 bricks per minute. The yard now turns out about 20,000 bricks per day, or 120,000 per week. The amount disbursed weekly as wages and in payment of other running expenses, is about \$500. The demand is nearly equal to the supply, and plices are about the same as those of last year. Since the season opened this spring about 800,000 bricks bave been turned out.
