WORKING UPON PLANS.

Preparations Being Made for Construction of Cactus Concentrator.

Plans are now being drawn for the mammoth concentrating mill to be precied at the Cactus mine in Beaver county, by Samuel Newhouse.

This work is in charge of Mr. A. J. Betties, at the head of the metallurgi-cal department of the Newhouse mining interests in this section.

It will probably take several months complete the plans, but it is expected that the actual construction of the new plant will be well advanced during the coming summer.

V. Taylor of the Suburban road left last night for Chicago in order to confer with the promoters of the Salt Lake & Suburban road regarding construction work.

C. E. Dufur, general chairman O. R. C. for the D. & R. G. system, comes out with a signed statement to the ef-fect that Manager J. M. Herbert is universally admired by the employes of the road for the absolute fairness and justice of his dealings, and that the news of his resignation came as a personal loss to the men.

Charles F. Tweed, chairman of the board of directors of the Southern Pa cific, will sever his connection with that corporation on Jan. 1 to become a partner in the banking house of Speyer & Co. Mr. Tweed for many years was a business associate of the late Collis P. Huntington, and is one of the executors of the Huntington estate.

When the Santa Fe has completed all its cut-offs and extensions now in process of construction in the southwest, it will have a route to San Francisco 468 miles shorter than the present one. It will then be in a better position to combat stronger competition, and will make shorter time from Chicago to the coast. The main cut-off across part of Texas and New Mexico will take the Santa Fe trains over a different route, avoiding the difficult mountain climbs.

T. A: Grady, who has been manager of the Santa Fe's California tourist service for the last three years, will leave the company the first of the year. He has been appointed traveling passenger agent of the Oceanic Steamship company, with headquarters at Sydney, Australia. His successor with the Santa Fe has not yet been appointed.
