Honorable Board of Education;

Gentlemen—Your committee on sites and buildings report having engaged the services of Architect Spohr to prepare plans and specifications of an addition of two rooms to the Twenty-first school, in accordance with a resolution of this board dated September 21st last.

An advertisement has been inserted in the Daily Tribune and Herald, copies of which advertisement are attached to this report and made a part hereof, soliciting bids for the erection of said improve-ments. Said bids accompany this re-

Your committee ask that their action be confirmed and that the contract be awarded to William T. Tuddenham, the lowest responsible bidder, for \$4317, who files with this committee a certified check for \$432.

## A SECOND REPORT.

The same committee presented the following report, which was also recieved and filed after being read:

To the President and Board of Education:

Gentlemen-Your committee on sites and buildings to whom was referred the duty of providing additional room for the schools of the city where needed, beg leave to report that they have secured the vestry of the Twentieth ward church from the Church Association of that ward for the snm of thirty dollars per month, with certain privileges and reservations, and that a school is now in successful operation therein; they have also secured the vestry from the Eighth ward Church Association for twenty-five dollars per month, with the right reserved to the Church to hold sessions of Sabbath school or other purposes, not to interfere with the regular session of the day school, and as chool is in successful operation there, thereby relieving the pressure of the Eighth and Twentieth schools; and we recommend that the president and clerk of the board be authorized to execute leases in behalf of the board with the offi-cers of the Church Association named on the terms named herein to the end of Jnne, 1892.

The committee has also secured the African Methodist church near the D. & R. G. depot for the sum of \$30 per month, and recommend the president and clerk to close a lease on the premises at the same terms as the Eighth and Twentieth. This will relieve the Sixth district.

In the Nineteenth district we found an In the Nineteenth district we found an enrollment in three rooms of over 230 pupils with three teachers and contemplated recommending the erection of an additional class room and recitation room to partially receive the pressure on that building, but after mature reflection, we think it would be more economical and desirable to adopt a plan for an cal and desirable to adopt a plan for an cal and destrible to adopt a plan for an eight-room building complete and erect thereon a portion of said building containing four rooms and closete, and have everything ready to complete the building at the close of the school year.

This building can be erected as near the center of the lux10 roads owned by the board as is desirable, by only removing at present one class-room that has been built about twenty years, and re-moving the other building at the close of this school year to complete the new building. This lot is centrally locat-ed to accommodate the children of the Mineteeuth and Twenty-second wards, of which there are within a three-block radius 872, and within a two-block radius 315 children.

We ask that this committee be author-Tzed to advertise for sealed bids for the erection of the building recommended as section of the building recommended as soon as the plan is approved. And that contractors be requested to state in their bids the price payable in bonds as well as the price payable in cash.

Mr. Young was called to the chair by Mr. Nelson, who offered the following resolution:

Resolved. That the Board cannot at this time enter into building contracts or purchase of sites, except as the contract may be made or the purchase be completed with the school honds.

Mr. Young favored making such improvements as were most needed, and paying for them in cash. A good deal of money would soon be coming In and the first thing to do should be to liquidate all overdrafts. Then, if necessary, the bonds could be hypotheticated and the improvements pushed.

M. Pratt was of the opinion that the best thing to do was to borrow the money and use the bonds as collateral. He believed that bonds could be sold later on at 5 per cent., and was there-fore opposed to the idea of increasing the interest to 6 per cent., because, in twenty years, it would mean a loss of \$120,000 to the Territory.

Mr. Duke concurred with Mr. Pratt.

Mr. Pike was in favor of hypothe-cating the bonds. It was the duty of the board to provide tultion for the children. The Legislature, he thought would make the necessary provisions to accomplish this. The plan pro-posed would enable them to wipe out the overdrafts which should be done as soon as possible.

More discussion of a similar strain was indulged in, after which Mr. Nelson offered the following resolution,

which was adopted:

"Resolved, That the finance committee order the bonds engraved and printed as soon as possible, and that we use 'said soon as possible, and that we use said bonds as collateral security in obtaining sufficient funds to do the needed improvements.

The board then adjourned for one
