## SESSION OF THE CITY COUNCIL.

Isaac Sloan's Relatives Located—Bad Man Wanted in Montana and Canada—News Notes

James Walker alias James Young, who caused such a reign of terror here a few weeks ago by forcing Deputy Belpap to ride on, but was later captured at Idaho Falls by Deputy Belpap and Sheriff Josephson of Brigham City after a desperate fight, is wanted in several places according to reports received by Sheriff Bailey.

The sheriff of Teton county, Mont., has written Sheriff Bailey that Walker's true name is John Payne, that he is wanted in the town of Chateau, Teton county, on the charge of grand larceny, that of stealing cattle at that place several months ago.

According to information furnished the sheriff from Medicine Hat, Alberta, Canada, he is also wanted in that place on a similar charge. He admits that he is wanted in Canada but says it is only for borrowing a horse which he forgot to return to its owner, as he puts it.

The officers here have two charges of assault with a deadly weapon, that of pulling a gun on Deputy Belpap and of threatening to shoot the railroad men, hence it has not been fully decided whether he will be turned over to the Montana or Canada officers for prosecution or made to face the two charges here, should either of the two places have a better case against him than the local officers have he may be turned over to them. He is evidently a hard man, and has made a business of evil dealing wherever he went. The officers say they think the Canada officers have a serious charge against him as he is very desirous of not being committed to go there.

**CARELESSNESS CAUSED DEATH.**  
A corner's inquest over the remains of Frank Vitell, the Italian laborer who was killed last Tuesday by a cave-in of the Twenty-first street sewer, was held yesterday afternoon commencing at 3 o'clock, before Judge Howell and the following jury: Fred A. Shiels, William Jensen and Horace Burrows.

Dr. A. S. Condon, who attended the injured man, and Undertaker Larkin testified to the extent of his injuries from the force of the dirt falling in on him, affecting his nervous system and probably causing a rupture of one of the arteries.

J. A. Bigler, foreman for Kelsey & Co., the contractors, on the sewer work, testified that he had removed the laborers from that point of the sewer where the cave-in occurred, and that all the men got out of the way excepting Vitell, who was told several times to move, but he had a good dry place to work in and did not obey the foreman. This testimony was corroborated by a number of other witnesses.

The building of the Twenty-first street sewer, after being out a short time, brought in a verdict that Vitell came to his death from injuries sustained by the caving in of the dirt on him; that he met his death through his own carelessness in not getting out of the place where the foreman told him to. Attorney Hansen of Salt Lake appeared for the contractors.

## CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

The regular meeting of the city council was held last evening, at which bids for grading Twenty-fourth street from Grant to 1st avenues, and Grante avenue from 2nd to Twenty-fourth streets, preparatory to the city's awarding to Jones & Wright, at \$10 cents per cubic yard, and five cents per cubic yard for overhaul.

The building of Sandstone crosswalks at intersection of Twenty-fourth and Grant and Twenty-fourth and Lincoln avenues was authorized.

The contract with P. J. Moran for grading Grant avenue was ordered executed.

Claims and payrolls were allowed amounting to \$12,124.80.

Ordinances levying special taxes were introduced and referred to law committee.

## ISAAC SLOAN'S RELATIVES.

The relatives of Isaac Sloan, who died suddenly Sunday morning at the city jail, have been located at Underkuffler Larkin. He has a daughter, Mrs. William Spencer, who resides at Randolph, Kan. Sloan's relatives have telephoned to that place for burial. The deceased also has relatives residing in Salt Lake City, and a daughter 16 years of age at the state industrial school. 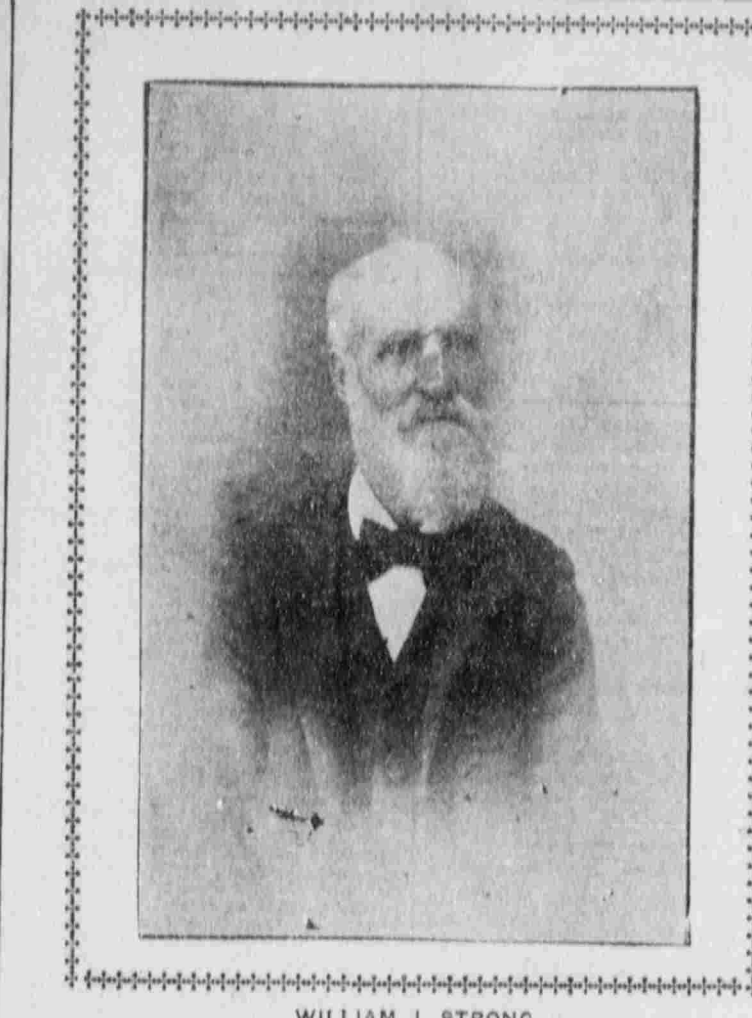
## UTAH SCHOOL WINS.

### SHOCKING DEATH BY CHOKING

Severin Salvoren Suddenly Expires at Supper Table—Mrs. G. Hansen Dead.

Hyrum, Cache Co., Sept. 30.—Severin Salvoren on the 23rd inst. expired very suddenly by choking while at supper through swallowing a piece of meat which got into his windpipe. Despite the most desperate struggle of the suffering man, it could not be dislodged, and before medical help could arrive, he was dead. Deceased was born in March, 1843, at Christiansand, Norway; was baptized in his youth, came here in 1875 and was married the same year. He leaves a wife, three grown children, two brothers and one sister. He held the office of an Elder and was a very industrious, reliable and faithful man, whose death has caused general regret in the community.

### MRS. GUNDEL HANSEN DEAD.

Gundel Kirstine Hansen died on the 27th inst. from general debility. The deceased was born March 27, 1827, at Kalroed, Frederiksborg's county, Denmark; married in 1851; baptized in 1852; arrived in Utah in 1874, direct from the old country. Two brothers, two sons, one daughter and several grandchildren mourn her departure. She was an energetic and devoted churchwoman, and used her means freely for the advancement of the Lord's work around her home. Funeral services over the remains were held at the stake building yesterday.

### AMOS HUNT DEAD.

Honored Veteran and Pioneer Lays Down Life's Burden at 85.

Teasdale, Wayne Co., Sept. 27.—On Sept. 8 we were called upon to lay to rest Father Amos Hunt, 85 years of age, having died of old age. Deceased was born in Kentucky of good old stock. Joined the church in 1848, lived one winter in Council Bluffs and reached Salt Lake City in 1853, with his family. He immediately began a life of pioneering, being a stout, robust man. From Ogden to St. George he spent his life in developing the desert. There were few if any houses in St. George when he went there, and he helped to build several towns in the southern part of the state. He also assisted a company of handcart emigrants in to Salt Lake City and took part in the Echo canyon campaign, when Johnston's army came to Utah. He raised a large family of good men and women who are following the example of their worthy father. He died at the home of his youngest daughter, Angeline, wife of Bishop George S. Colman. He was the father of 16 children, 10 of whom survive him. He had 80 grandchildren and 68 great grandchildren.

### Father Hunt belonged to that noble band of pioneers, now few in number, who redeemed Utah from the desert, and made it one of the best Commonwealths in the sisterhood of states. The communities among which he lived, delight to do him honor and reverse his memory.
