

HEARST TELLS OF HIS PROWESS

Alone, Without Aid, Comfort or Convivance, He Has Fought The Trusts.

HE MADE GREAT KILLINGS.

Also Talked About the Degenerate New York Editors, Not Including Himself.

New York, Oct. 22.—The announcement that William R. Hearst, who heads the independence league and Democratic state tickets, as well as other candidates, would address a meeting held under the auspices of the league, tonight, served to draw a crowd that put a premium on standing room in Madison Square Garden.

Mr. Hearst made the principal speech in the Garden. His arrival and his appearance upon the platform were signals for enthusiastic demonstrations and the applause and cheering was renewed frequently. Mr. Hearst had much to say concerning corporations and something about his opponent on the Republican ticket. Mr. Hearst opened his address by saying that he had just returned from a tour up-state in the so-called Republican counties and that he would come down to Madison Square Garden with a majority and that all the votes he would get in the city would be "wasted." He believed, he said, that he would be elected governor by a majority of 150,000.

Mr. Hearst told how he had fought the "trusts" in the interests of the people. He fished out and killed the "trusts" and next tackled the "trusts" and put the "trusts" out of office. He then made war on the "trusts" and the rebelling system.

Mr. Hearst continued: "While I have been away from New York, newspapers have been lying as industriously and persistently and recklessly as ever. They have had this time a little assistance from the so-called captains of industry. I defy them and they can vote for Hughes if they want. I do not ask any man in this audience for his vote, but I want his good opinion."

As Mr. Hearst concluded there was a rush for the exits of those who wished to hear him address the overflow meetings outside.

A crowd that rivaled in proportions the audience within the Garden, heard Mr. Hearst outside, where he made two brief speeches.

ANTI-HEARST CAMPAIGN.
New York, Oct. 22.—William J. Connors, Democratic chairman, from information received from Patrick H. McCabe, Democratic state committee man at Albany county, announced today that Democratic headquarters at Albany had been seized this afternoon by the state, headed by ex-Mayor Thomas M. Osborne of Auburn. The information of the alleged seizure of the headquarters was brought to this city tonight by Mr. McCabe, who commanded it to W. R. Hearst. A hurried conference was called which included Messrs. Hearst, Connors, McCabe and others.

An active anti-Hearst campaign is to be made throughout the state by the dissatisfied Democrats.

Former Mayor Osborne was one of those who with Dist. Atty. General McCall and other Democrats met in conference at Albany before the Buffalo convention. The conference was opposed to the endorsement of Hearst by the state Democracy.

Mr. McCabe for the past 12 years has been prominent in state politics. He was mentioned prominently for the position of chairman of the state Democratic committee but declined in favor of the present incumbent, W. J. Connors. Mr. Connors proceeded to take action detrimental to the state candidates he would procure a court injunction against them.

Mr. Murphy also was in conference with Messrs. Connors and McCabe over the situation. When asked if he had anything to say he replied: "Not a word."

LIFE INSURANCE RATES ARE TOO HIGH.

Indianapolis, Oct. 22.—A special commission appointed by the governor, which has been investigating the office of the state auditor for a year, with special reference to mutual and stock life insurance companies, today submitted its report to Gov. Hanly. The general conclusions of the committee are that the cost of life insurance to the public is too high. The present maximum premium rates for insurance are so much in excess of needs as to permit of extravagant management of companies, theft of their funds, division of profits and other great abuses without rendering the companies insolvent. Indiana's companies, like many companies of other states, have been guilty of extravagances and abuses though they have maintained solvency.

MONTANA MINING CO. CASE.

Washington, Oct. 22.—In the matter of the controversy between the Montana Mining company and the St. Louis Mining company, involving the ownership of a part of the valuable Drummond mine in Lewis and Clark county, Montana, the supreme court of the United States today granted the Montana company leave to file its petition for an injunction, making the rule returnable in 10 days and in the meantime granting a temporary injunction against the St. Louis company prohibiting it from taking out ore.

The supreme court today refused to assume jurisdiction in the case of Mayor Rose of Kansas City, Kan. A fine of \$1,000 was imposed against Rose by the supreme court of Kansas for assuming office as mayor after he had been deposed on a charge of failure to enforce the law of the state. The effect of the court's action will be to leave the sentence of the state court in effect.

OHIO BRIDGE CO'S.

Decision Handed Down Which Virtually Ousts Them From State.

Bellefontaine, O., Oct. 22.—The circuit court today handed down a decision which in effect ousts from the state of Ohio all the bridge companies that failed to surrender at the so-called bridge trust hearing weeks ago.

The Ohio companies deprived of their charters by the decision today are the Variety Iron Works of Cleveland, Iron Sub-Structure company of Columbus and the Columbus Bridge company of Beaver Falls, Pa., was ordered from the state.

John R. Cassidy, William R. Liven and E. P. Chamblain of Bellefontaine were appointed trustees to wind up the business of these companies.

HAVANA ASYLUM.

Gov. Magoon Interests Himself and Orders an Investigation.

Havana, Oct. 22.—Gov. Magoon, as a result of the deplorable conditions as revealed at the national asylum for the insane, has ordered the immediate repair of the old and the erection of new buildings. While hundreds of patients were sleeping on the floor, the government saved \$4,000 from the food account, which Mr. Magoon has ordered

BOYNTON IS GUILTY.

Gets Six Months for Counterfeiting Venezuelan Silver Coin.

New York, Oct. 22.—Capt. George Boynton pleaded guilty today in the United States circuit court to the charge of being a party to a plan for counterfeiting silver coins of Venezuela for the purpose of financing a revolution in that country. He was sentenced to six months in the King's county penitentiary. Leslie M. Thompson and Cash B. Wox, who were associated with Boynton, were fined \$200 and \$100 respectively. When arrested Capt. Boynton produced papers to show that he was in New York as the special commissioner of a Venezuelan revolutionary party, and that it was his purpose to finance a revolution by making up duplicate silver dollars of the same fineness and intrinsic value as those issued by the government, which would be legalized by act of the junta when the present government of Venezuela was overthrown.

IMMIGRATION CONFERENCE.

Pres. Roosevelt Invited to Visit the One at Nashville Next Month.

Washington, Oct. 22.—N. F. Thompson of Chattanooga, Tenn., called at the White House today and invited President Roosevelt to attend the immigration and quarantine conference to be held in Nashville next month and, on the president's invitation, Mr. Thompson called again tonight. The president, however, declined the invitation, because he could not find it possible to attend. Mr. Thompson said he suggested to the president that the ill-natured and asked to talk with Secretary Taft and Chairman Shonts of the Panama canal commission, on the subject. I will call on them tomorrow.

GOMPERS' ADVICE TO FEDERATION OF LABOR.

Chicago, Oct. 22.—President Samuel Gompers, of the American federation of labor, was asked yesterday by leading Chicago manufacturers to advise the local unions to cease fighting among themselves. If this fighting was not stopped, he was told, "open shops" could be established in the large manufacturing factories of the city.

The case was put plainly to Mr. Gompers. He was informed that either the unions must abide by their written contracts and conduct themselves peaceably, or else a great lockout, which may involve as many as 6,000 or 7,000 skilled factory workers, will follow.

Adding to the committee, Mr. Gompers admitted they were in the right and declared that union strife must stop at once.

The labor leader left for Lafayette, Ind., where he promised to confer with President of the International Brotherhood of Carpenters, one of the organizations involved in the controversy.

President Gompers consisted of President Ben Singer of the Brunswick-Balke-Columbian company, Oscar Baskin of the L. L. Carbone company, and J. M. Hanly of the A. H. Revell company. All are members of the New York workingmen's association, which comprises practically all of the large factories in Chicago.

HUGHES BEGINS HIS LAST CAMPAIGN.

Kingston, N. Y., Oct. 22.—Beginning his third and last campaign tour of the state, Charles E. Hughes came into Ulster county today and made two speeches there. He made a special plea for the Democratic votes, saying in this connection:

"The political cockroaches and croton bugs of the Democratic party are not those with whom the Republicans are ashamed to associate in this campaign. Continuing, he said:

"I want to see Albany clean and corrupt lobbying gone away with. I want it so nothing can be accomplished except on a fair presentation of the case on its merits and that no one is powerful enough or rich enough to get anything at all which is not in the interest of all the people."

"I have been recently in receipt of many communications asking me what I propose to do in regard to certain departments in regard to certain commissions."

"I have stated that I have desired and should make an examination of matters in departments, that I should ascertain whether there was any wrong doing and fix the responsibility for it, no matter what stood in the way. When I say that, I mean it."

SILVEIRA MAKES GOOD HIS ESCAPE.

Washington, Oct. 22.—The United States can take no steps to bring about the extradition of Silveira, the Cuban banker wanted in Havana and now supposed to be in Caracas, Venezuela. There is no extradition treaty between the republic of Cuba and Venezuela and the United States cannot interfere in any way in the case, according to state department officials. Consequently, Gov. Magoon must ask President Castro to be taken by Cuban authorities, but the outcome is dependent entirely upon the will of President Castro.

CARPENTER'S DEATH.

Caused by Chronic Nephritis and Not By Morphine Poisoning.

Chicago, Oct. 22.—Inquiry into the death of M. J. Carpenter alleged swindler, at the Stanton avenue station Sunday night, has made the man who called the jury returned a verdict that death had been caused by chronic nephritis and not, as it was at first believed, by morphine poisoning.

A life insurance policy for \$20,000, made out in the name of Carpenter's wife, was found among the man's effects. Metcalf, the jury was instructed to turn the policy over to Mrs. Carpenter.

DETENTION QUARTERS ARE MUCH TOO SMALL.

New York, Oct. 22.—After a visit of inspection to the immigrant station on Ellis island today, Victor Metcalf, secretary of the department of commerce and labor, declared that the detention quarters on the island were too small and overcrowded. The secretary was accompanied on his visit of inspection by Frank P. Sargent, commissioner general of immigration. Sec. Metcalf hoped that Congress would make an appropriation to increase the accommodations, and suggested that one way of lessening overcrowding would be to establish examination boards in European ports to determine the eligibility of immigrants for admission.

The secretary said he would favor a change in the present law which excludes boys less than 16 years old who are unaccompanied. Under this law, he said, a lot of good material is constantly going to waste.
