LIFE INSURANCE RATES ARE TOO HIGH.

Indianapolis, Oct. 22.—A special com-mission appointed by the governor, which has been investigating the office of the state auditor for a year, with special reference to mutual and stock life insurance companies, today sub-mitted its report to Gov. Hanly. The general conclusions of the committee general conclusions of the committee are that the "cost of life insurance to the public is too high. The present maximum premium rates for insur-ance are so much in excess of needs as to permit of extravagant manage-ment of companies, theft of their funds, division of profits and other great abuses without rendering the com-panies insuolvent. Indiana's companies, like many companies of other states, have been guilty of extrava-gances and abuses though they have maintained solvency."

MONTANA MINING CO. CASE.

U. S. Supreme Court Grants Leave to File Petition for Injunction.

Washington, Oct. 22.—In the matter of the controversy between the Mon-tana Mining company and the St. Louis Mining company, involving the owner-ship of a part of the valuable Drum-Lummon mine in Lewis and Clark county, Montana, the supreme court of Lummon the United States today granted the Montana company leave to file its peti-tion for an injunction, making the rule returnable in 10 days and in the mean-time granting a temporary injunction against the St. Louis company prohibting it from taking out ore.

The supreme court today refused to assume jurisdiction in the case of Mayor Rose of Kansas City, Kan. A fine of \$1,000 was imposed against Rose by the supreme court of Kansas for assuming office as mayor after he had been deposed on a charge of failure to enforce the lluor laws of the state. The effect of the court's action will be to leave the sentence of the state court in effect.

CARPENTER'S DEATH.

Caused by Chronic Nephritis and Not By Morphine Poisoning.

Chicago. Oct. 23.-Inquiry into the deate of M. L. Carpenter, alleged swindler, at the Stanton avenue station Sunday night, was made yesterday by the coroner. The jury returned a verdict that death had been caused by chronic nephritis and not. as it was at first believed, by morphine poisoning. A life insurance policy for \$20,000, made out in the name of Carpenter's wife, was found among the man's effects. Mrs. Car-penter is said to be dying of consump-tion in Denver.

BOYNTON IS GUILTY.

Gets Six Months for Counterficiting Venezuelan Silver Coin.

Venezuelan Silver Coin. New York, Oct. 22.--Capt. George Boynton pleaded guilty today in the United States circuit court to the charge of being a party to a plan for counterfeiting silver coins of Venezue-la for the purpose of financing a revo-lution in that country. He was sen-tenced to six months in the King's county penitentiary. Leslie M. Thomp-son and Cash B. Wilcox, who were as-sociated with Boynton, were fined \$250 and \$110 respectively. When arrested Capt. Boynton produced papers to show that he was in New York as the spe-cial commissioner of a Venezuelan rev-clutionary party, and that it was his purpose to finance a revolution by mak-ing up duplicate silver dollars of the same fineness and intrinsic value as those issued by the government, which would be legalized by act of the junta when the present government of Vene-zuela was overthrown.

IMMIGRATION CONFERENCE.

Prest. Roosevelt Invited to Visit the One at Nashville Next Month.

One at Nashville Next Month. Washington, Oct. 22.-N. F. Thompson of Chattanooga, Tenn., called at the White House today and invited President Roosevelt to attend the immigration and quarantine conference to be held in Nash-ville next month and, on the president's invitation, Mr. Thompson called again tonight. The president, however, declined the invitation, because he could not find it possible to attend. Mr. Thompson said he suggested to the president that the idle negroes in the south be utilized for labor on the Panama canal. "The better class of the negroes in the south," he ex-plained, "would ald the white poople in securing this class of labor for that work. It is the idle negro that makes the trou-he in the south and reflects on the better class of negroes.

class of negroes. "The president was impressed with the suggestion, and asked to talk with Sery Taft and Chairman Shonts of the Panama canal commission, on the subject. I will call on them tomorrow."

GOMPERS' ADVICE TO

FEDERATION OF LABOR.

Chicago. Oct. 22.—President Samuel Gompers. of the American federation of labor, was asked yesterday by leading Chicago manufacturers to compel local unions to cease fighting among them-selves. If this fighting was not stopped he was told, "open shops" would be estab-lished in the large woodworking factories of the city. The case was put plainly to Mr. Gomp-ers. He was informed that either the unions must abide by their written con-tracts and conduct themselves peaceably, or eise a great lockout, which may lin-volve as man yas 6.009 or 7.000 skilled factory workers, will follow. After receiving the committee, Mr. Gompers admitted they were in the right and declared that union strife must stop at once.

The labor leader left for Lafayette, Ind., where he promised to confer with President Hubert of the International Brotherhood of Carpenter, one of the or-ganizations involved in the controversy. The committee which waited on President Gompers consisted of President Ben Singer of the Brunswick-Balke-Col-lender company, Oscar Bauer of the Li-quid Carbonic company, and J. M. Haniy of the A. H. Revell company. All are members of the Woodworking Manufac-turers' association, which comptises prac-tically all of the large factories in Chi-cago.
