Terrific Rainstorm Does Considerable Damage.

The flood did its greatest harm on the house of the late John M. Malin. The water came down the canyon in a stream twice as large as the Weber river as

it passes through Rockport. The path of the stream is marked by large stones and boulders, some weighing as much as 200 pounds.

Boise, Ida., Aug. 27 .- Throughout the northern and western portions of the state the weather was warm, with only a few light showers at scattered points. in the southwestern valleys, the tem-perature reached 100 degrees on the 23rd. Over the eastern countles the weather was cooler, and beneficial rains occurred early in the week; some heavy winds are reported from Bing-ham county, but no damage resulted. CROPS.

Fruit and Melons: Warm weather has caused fruit to ripen rapidly, though, in some northern localities growth has been retarded by drouth Early apples are ripe in northern and eastern districts; in the valleys of the southwestern portion of the state, ap-ples, pears and melons are being marketed in quantities; cantaloupes are abundant, and are of excellent quality Young fruit trees have made good growth throughout the season.

Hay and Grain: Harvest of the sec-ond crop of alfalfa progressed rapidly in eastern districts while in the southvestern sections, the third crop is being harvested; the second cutting of timothy and clover is nearing comple-tion. Except in a few localities, the hay crop is good the later cuttings having been better than the first. In Oneida and Bingham counties some alfalfa was injured slightly by the rain Grain harvest is nearly complete in

most sections, and threshing is pro-gressing rapidly; irrigated grain is yielding well; in localities of Fremont county, "dry farm" grain is reported as being well filled, but elsewhere the crop is very light.

Corn has made good growth and romises well. Vegetables: Garden vegetables of all

PRINCE HENRY NO MODEL. His Unprincipled Career-Own Companions Branded Him a Coward.

Prince Henry of Orleans, who started some time ago on a trip around the world with the object of returning via America and of spending August and September at Newport, died on Friday at Saigon in French Cochin-China. He was the eldest son of the Duke of Chartres, who was aid to General McClellan during the civil war in this country, and who under the name of "Robert Lefort" won distinction by his gallantry in the Franco-Austrian war of 1859 and the Franco-German war of

Prince Henry was a source of much trouble and concern to his parents, was disinherited by his godfather, the late Duke of Aumale, on account of his misconduct, and was publicly branded as a profigate by the Spanish government in the Cortes, when the ministers ex-plained to the national legislature that his suit for the hand of the Princess of the Asturias had been rejected in con-sequence of the unsavory character of his private life. In the duel which he was forced to fight with the late King Humbert's nephew, the Count of Turin, he conducted himself in a manner that did not redound to his credit, and although branded by the explorer Bon-valot, who had been his mentor and companion, as a coward, and as having secured the cross of the Legion of Honor by fraud, yet he never made any attempt to call Bonvalot to account for his public charges, either in the courts of law or on the so-called field of honor. The fraud of which he was accused was to the effect that he had never really visited the countries which he claimed to have explored, but based his reports to the Geographical society of France upon the works of other travel ers. These accusations were supported by affidavits signed by French officials in the far East, to the effect that the prince had been at Saison, and at other French settlements, attending dinner parties and picnics there at the when, according to his reports, he was facing danger of every kind in the ilds of Asia.

The prince never made any effort to disprove these accusations, and on two occasions only escaped being posted at the Parisian clubs to which he belonged for non-payment of his sambling debts by the timely intervention of the late Baron Hirsch, while his own father was obliged to appeal to the French courts to have him judicially declared as trre-sponsible and as incapable of managing his affairs. He was bright, but utterly unprincipled, and his career was an il lustration of wasted opportunity .-- Chicago Tribune.
