EXAMINATION.

INTERESTING EXERCISES AT THE
CLOSE OF THE SCHOOL YEAR.

This morning at 10 o'clock, the closing exercises of this institution commenced. There were present of members of the board of directors, A. O. Smoot, H. H. Cluff and Myron Tanner. Many distinguished visitors and friends and relatives of students were in attendance.

The exercises were begun by the singing of hymns by the efficient choir, under the leadership of Miss Nettie Sou hworth; prayer.

Next in order was the examination and criticism of the normal class in grammar, arithmetic and United States history by Benjamin Cluff, preceptor. Miss Mary A. Frantzen having the highest mark of distinction in each of these studies.

Other members of the class had also attained high percentages.

Prof. J. M. Tanner passed criticism on physical and topical geography, for the normal students; and on natural philosophy, general history, surveying, physical geography; Ray's higher arithmetic, and book keeping for special graduates. The highest percentage was awarded to the following students in the above branches:

Martha Snow, physical geography; Mary A. Frantzen, topical geography; Eleazer Evans, natural philosophy and general history; John E. Clark, book-keeping; William Barnes, arithmetic; Orvil Thompson, surveying.

Prof. M. H. Hardy passed criticism on his special classes, in physiology and phonography. In this latter branch, Willard Done had the highest percentage; in chemistry, Joseph Nelson attained the highest number; penmanship for all the classes.

K. G. Measer, Principal, reported that fifteen of the normal class had graduated and will receive diplomas. Mr. Eleazer Evans graduated in a scientific course. Miss Martha Snow stood foremost as a normal teacher, while a large percentage of the students follow close in points of efficiency.

The names of those graduating are:—Eleazer Evans, in scientific course; Martha Snow, Lucy Taylor, Mary A. Frantzen, Willard Done, Joseph Nelson, Sabina Davis, Andrew J. Stewart, Ella M. Williams, Jennie L. Acord, Luella M. Hyde,—first degrees of efficiency as teachers. The following have the second degree,—Annie J. Wride, Olive Haws, and Eliza Smith. High praise was given by the Principal as to the extreme moral character of the graduating students. After which his report to the Board was read.

Remarks were made in behalf of the graduating classes by E. Evans, and in behalf of the normal class by Miss Lucy Taylor. Brief and pointed remarks by President D. John, Elder I. M. Coombs, Prest. H. H. Cluff and Prest. A. O. Smoot. This evening the students will participate in a social party, after which parting congratulations will be in order from students to each other.—Enquirer.

Sperry made very appropriate remarks, aided by the Spirit of God, comforting the bereaved that they were present, and a fervent prayer by Brother Joel Grover to God our heavenly Father for His blessings to rest upon the bereaved family, and upon her husband now on a mission to England.

The Nephi Brass Band were in attendance, and her remains were conveyed to the cemetery, followed by her family and many friends.
