

a means to enrich himself; it was the spirit of that god who commanded him to do so.

At this time there was no ax on these islands; a stone was the axe, and it was with this it was cut; and hence its name, "Kalaipahoa," because it was with a stone pahoa (or ax) it was cut.

When Puanui became in possession of that tree, his fame soon spread abroad, and he became a great man and very rich, and that tree became noted, and therefore the place where it grew was much sought for, and all its roots and branches and also the other trees, were dug up and carried away and worshipped. And this tree was cut into many pieces, some larger and some smaller, and none but the high chiefs and priests became in possession of the same up to the present time; and this image which I send I inherited from my father, because my forefathers were priests.

THE MANNER OF WORSHIP.

The priests were a separate people and did not attend to the worshipping and sacrificing to this wooden god; they were spokesmen, or persons who conversed with the god when he rested on some man, or by vision or dream. But there were also other persons, called overseers or guardians of the gods, who looked after the gods and sacrificed constantly the food morning and evening, and the food of the god was put into a certain vessel called the "Kahauli," and in there was red fish and food and hulu-hulu awa. (The awa is a root from which the natives used to make a kind of liquor.) This food however was not eaten by the god, neither was it believed the god was able to eat it, but was merely said to be given to him. This eating was called a "awa ani;" the real eating was different when he rested on some man.

The correct name of this god is "Kane" (male); he was not a god who rested frequently on the people by their being possessed or inspired by him, because at a certain time he came personally and dwelt with a body like unto man among the people.

This wooden image is a body of the god Kane, but he was not in it, but it was the same as an image to look at to remember him by, and also to put them in mind that he would not forsake the person who kept his image to stir up the minds of the worshippers.

They did not believe that the image would at any time speak to them, they well understood the wood could not speak. There were many images carved out of this tree, whose general name was Kalaipahoa, but were also called after the names of the different gods; the original name of all of which was Kane.

The worshipping and consecrations at all times, with all the laws and oaths, were all done in the name of Kane Kaulanaula.

Kane Kaulanaula was the great god of these Islands, and this image was his wooden body; there were also some made of stone called Pohakuokane (stone of kane); these were all over these Islands. And if any were sick they went to the stone of Kane and there worshipped Kane Kaulanaula, and the sick would be healed, because the people believed that Kane Kaulanaula would come to that place; there was also a water called the healing water of Kane Kaulanaula; it was spring water poured into a bottle (or gourd used for a bottle) and consecrated.

When this wooden image was made to make manifest their worshipping Kane, they killed a hog and took the nose of the hog and the melt, and awa (a native liquor) and cocoanut, and mixed all together and rubbed over the image; this was called "anointing," and thus they did every month till the days of Haa and Kane, chiefs of the Islands.

There are many traditions respecting Kane which are not written here, but I shall only write a little more concerning this image.

RESPECTING THE MANNER THEY USED TO DO WITH THIS IMAGE.

This wood is a poison wood, and if it be scraped and given to man or beast, they will die; and this is one reason it was kept by the chiefs of the Hawaiian Islands in order to give to other chiefs.

If it was scraped with the opihii, (a small shell fish) this god would frequently fly as a fire in the night, and was called a flying god. The people of Hawaii knew when they saw him flying that the wooden god was being scraped. These things are perhaps not entirely done away in the houses of some of the Hawaiian chiefs at the present time.

The flying was not exactly like the flying of the comet, but was round before and rather long and curling behind, and would burst when about to enter into a cloud, and this is what is called Kalaipahoa and Akuaahai (the god of poison).

The power of the spiritual body was different. He told me some things when I was possessed (or inspired) by him at a certain time. So no more at present.
