INVOLUNTARY MANSLAUGHTER

Verdict Rendered by Jury at Close of Trial of Harry Moss.

LIMIT OF PUNISHMENT 1 YEAR.

Peterson-Jenkins Nuptials—Bold Daylight Burglary—Junction City Briefs and Personals.

Ogden, Utah, April 28.—Guilty of involuntary manslaughter was the verdict rendered by the jury last night in the case of the State of Utah against Harry Moss, charged with manslaughter, that of stabbing William E. Stone, on June 10, 1904, at the Ogden Canyon resort, as the result of which he died the following morning. The case was submitted to the jury at 6 o'clock last evening, who after being out a little over three hours, brought in the verdict mentioned.

The hearing of the case was commenced Monday morning at 10 o'clock. The greater part of Monday was taken up in securing a jury and the other three hours were spent in the evidence and making the arguments.

Yesterday morning the defense put a number of the police officers on the witness stand to testify to their having arrested the Stone boy for drunkenness and other minor offenses, the state objected to such evidence and the court sustained the objection.

A deposition from Dr. J. D. Carnes was read which stated that on the night of the fatal stabbing his doctor attended Moss at a room in the Broom hotel, that Moss had been in a fight and was badly bruised up, his eyes were black and badly swollen and he had a slight cut for several inches across the chest, and that he had instructed a man named Brown to take care of Moss' shirt which was cut in two places down the front for several inches.

Moss was recalled by the state and to questions submitted to him stated that about four years ago he had an altercation in Murdoch's restaurant with a man named David O'Kane and a friend who had called witness vice names, but denied that he either used or threw a knife on that occasion.

O'Kane testified that he had trouble with Moss in the restaurant but did not remember whether any weapon was used by Moss.

The state put in a little rebuttal evidence, after which lengthy arguments were made by Attorneys Halvorson and Maginnis for the prosecution and attorneys MacMillan and H. H. Henderson for the defendant. The judge's instructions to the jury were very lengthy.

The court after hearing the verdict said, "I think that he would sentence the defendant May 1, but should he get the sentence now, he can only be sentenced to serve one year in the county jail."

DAYLIGHT BURGLARY.

The burglars who are operating in and around Ogden are becoming very bold in their work, and are not limiting their operations to the night time. Last night the home of Mrs. Gray, 634 Twenty-second Street, in one of the best residence parts of the city, was entered by burglars, and thoroughly ransacked, while the members of the family were absent from the house. Entrance was gained through a window. Once inside, a thorough search of the house was made, with the result that a sum of \$1,000 in silver, diamond rings, some other jewelry, and a large amount of money. They were not after silverware or anything of that kind, as a quantity of that was passed up by them. The family on returning a short time afterwards discovered the robbery, and reported the same to the police, who are working on slight clues.
