

MITCHELL CHOKE FULL OF DEFIANCE

If Sent to Jail, When He Comes
Out He Proposes to Exercise
All His Rights.

HEEDLESS OF CONSEQUENCES

Wants His Liberty Not That Enunciated
by Some of the Courts
Of the Country.

Toronto, Ont., Nov. 17.—Endorsing a report of the committee on boycott, John Mitchell, one of the three officers of the American Federation of Labor, under sentence for contempt of court, made a dramatic speech to the convention. He declared that so far as he is concerned, regardless of consequences, he intended, while at liberty, to declare for the rights guaranteed him by the Constitution.

REPORT ON BOYCOTT

The report which drew forth Mitchell's speech, and which was adopted by the convention, declared:

"We say, that when your cause is just, and every other remedy has been employed without result—boycott; we say that when the employer has determined to exploit, not only adult male labor, but men, women and children, and our reasoning appeal to his fairness and his conscience will not sway him—boycott; we say that when labor has been organized, boycotted, tyrannized—boycott; we say that when social

and political conditions become so bad that ordinary remedial measures are fruitless—boycott, and finally, we say we have a right to boycott; and we propose to exercise that right. In the application of this right of boycott, we propose to strike on and on.

MITCHELL'S POSITION.

Mr. Mitchell said that he realized every statement made by those on the convention floor, and especially by those who on next Monday would have to deliver themselves to the courts, is being closely scrutinized. "I want the people of the United States to know my position, and I shall not speak definitely, but I shall not surrender any right guaranteed to me by the Constitution of my country. If I know myself, not any amount of suffering will persuade me that I have not the right to spend my money where I please, or that I have not the right to write and speak as I please."

"I understand that cognizance is being taken at Washington of the utterances of men on the floor of this convention, and I want clearly to state my position."

"I propose in the future, as I have in the past, to exercise the rights secured to me by the fathers of my country; and I propose, if I am sent to jail, to declare again when I come out that I shall not, for myself, purchase any produce of the Hicks Store & Range company. I make this declaration, not to tickle the ear of any man, but that I may publicly declare the conviction that it is within me."

"I seem to me that the whole proceedings should prove a lasting lesson to the workmen of the United States and Canada. If all the workmen had been true to themselves, there would not have been a non-union product on the market."

"I repeat that, so far as I am concerned, and let the consequences be what they may, I intend, while at liberty, to declare for the rights guaranteed to me by the organic laws of my country. I am proud of being an American."

Mr. Mitchell said he had grown up as an American with a stepmother so poor that he could not buy bread, and told how he had crept out of bed at night to get his father's soldier coat to keep him warm.

"But I want to see the word American stand for all the sentiment that is symbolized by the flag of our country," he continued. "I want real liberty. I do not believe in the liberty enunciated by some of our courts that men and women should have the right to work themselves to death."

"I do not believe in the liberty enunciated by Judge Tuttle of Chicago, who declared unconstitutional the 10-hour law for women, and by that act compelled them to work 14 hours a day."

Mr. Mitchell said that he believed the present proceedings would bring home to the people the necessity of working in concert.

"Is the time going to come on our continent when the badge of faithfulness to labor must be the brand of imprisonment?" he said in conclusion. "Surely I hope not. I hope that the government may be so conducted that no citizen may feel that he has not been given justice and an equal right with every other citizen."

SHIPPERS' RIGHTS

AND THE RAILROADS

Washington, Nov. 17.—The shippers' point of view of transportation problems was laid before the convention of the National Association of Railway Commissioners at its session today. This task had been assigned to J. C. Lathrop, of the traffic bureau of the merchants' exchange of St. Louis, who addressed the convention. Here are some of the amendments of the laws and of railway rules and regulations which he said were required by shipping interests.

Making the giving of erroneous quotations of rates by carriers agents a misdemeanor; giving the power to some body to award damages to shippers as a result of such errors.

Enactment of a law allowing carriers to meet and confer as to tariff rates and regulations without violating the law of the land.

Creation of a special court to have exclusive and final jurisdiction over questions arising from the orders of the interstate commerce commission, except in such instances where constitutional questions would necessitate an appeal to the supreme court of the United States.

GEORGE CROCKER'S

DAYS ARE NUMBERED

New York, Nov. 17.—Relatives of George Crocker, youngest son of the late Charles Crocker, inheritor of one-fourth of the \$20,000,000 estate left by the California pioneer, are gathering at his bedside here in the belief that he has only a short time to live. According to his brother, William H. Crocker, who has arrived from Europe, he is

suffering from cancer of the stomach, the same disease from which his wife died in 1907.

Mrs. George P. Alexander, a sister, and C. Templeton Crocker, a nephew, are on their way here from California. They will remain until the end comes. Mr. Crocker, who is 51 years old, was operated on two years ago, but the relief was only temporary. His brother states that he is unable to leave his bed and that while he suffers constantly from intense pain, his only diversion is reading the newspaper.

WILL ATTEMPT TO CROSS ATLANTIC IN BALLOON

New York, Nov. 17.—Joseph Brucker, whose project for crossing the Atlantic-ocean in a dirigible balloon attracted some attention last spring, now makes the announcement from Berlin that the trial will be made within the next six months.

In a letter to the Aero club of America, Mr. Brucker states that Dr. Gaus, president of the Automobile club of Munich, is backing the enterprise and that a large dirigible balloon is being built. He suggests that the Aero club of America offer a prize for the first aeronaut to make the transatlantic trip. It is Mr. Brucker's plan to follow the course taken by Columbus.

The transatlantic aircraft will carry three or four men and will be equipped with lifeboats and other safety devices. It will be followed by speedy gunboats or other craft.

FIREMAN AND BRAKEMAN KILLED IN COLLISION

Dayton, O., Nov. 17.—A double header, eight train southbound and a passenger northbound on the Cincinnati, Hamilton & Dayton, met in a head-on collision a few miles north of this city shortly after 6 o'clock this morning. Two men, a fireman and a brakeman, were killed.

WILLIE MCKAY ARRAIGNED.

Repeats to Court Confession He Made At Time of Arrest.

Lawrence, Kan., Nov. 17.—Willie McKay, the 15-year-old Jacksonville, Fla., bandit, was arraigned before Judge Means of the juvenile court here today, charged with robbing the Bodega State bank in company with Earl Bullock.

Young McKay repeated to the court the confession he made following his arrest, to which he added the declaration that Bullock had threatened to kill him if he deserted.

"I would rather have been killed myself than killed some one else," said the youthful prisoner.

Frederick Starr, the bank cashier, whom Bullock shot in the jaw, appealed to the court for leniency for McKay. McKay, Starr said, was too scared to have shot when he (Starr) entered the bank and he added it was his opinion that Bullock had not really intended to shoot him.

Judge Means finally continued the investigation indefinitely until he could hear whether or not Jacksonville had a juvenile court.

New York, Nov. 17.—Money or call firm, of Frank Lettus, William Hasty and James Hays were found today four miles west of the Hill Top mine in the Horseshoe district, on the line between Clark and Lake counties. The men had been frozen to death. They started for the mine Monday, taking an express wagon to the end of the trail, four or five miles from the mines. Evidently they had been caught in a blizzard, had crunched by the trail for shelter and had gradually succumbed. All three were residents of Leadville and were unmarried.
