HEEDLESS OF CONSEQUENCES

Wants Bg & Liberty Not That Enunciated by Some of the Courts Of the Country,

IT.-Endersing a report of the committee on beyentt, John Mitchell, one of the three officers of the American Federation of Labor under sentence for contempt of court, made a dramatic spouch to the convention. REPORT ON BOYCOTT

The report which drew forth Mitch-ett's speech, and which was adopted by the convention, declared. "We say, that when your cause is just, and every other remedy has been employed without result-boycoit; we say that, when the employer has de-termined to exploit, not only adoit male labor, but may women and children. labor, but men, women and children, and our reasoning appeal to his fair-ness and his conscience will not sway him-buycott; we say that, when labor has been opposed, browbeaten, tyran-nized-boycott; we say that when social



and political conditions become so had that ordinary remedial measures are fruttless—boycott, and finally, we say we have a right to boycott; and we we have a right to boycott; and we propose to exercise that right. In the application of this right of boycott, to paraphrase the president (Gompers) we propose to stirve on and on." The convention broke into loud cheer-ing for Mitchell as he concluded, and there were cries for Morrison. The secretary did not respond. President Gompers was absent.

MITCHELL'S POSITION.

Mr. Mitchell said that he realized every statement made by those on the convention floor, and especially by those who on next Monday would have to deliver themselves to the courts, is be-ing closely scrutinized. "I want the people of the United States to know my people of the United States to know my position. I shall not speak defaulty, but I shall not surrender any right guaranteed to me by the Constitution of our country. If I know myself, not any amount of suffering will persuade me that I have not the right to spend my money where I please, or that I have not the right to write and speak as I please.

"T understand that cognizance is be-ing taken at Washington of the utber-ances of men on the floor of this con-vention, and I want clearly to state my

vention, and I want clearly to state my position.
"I propose is the future, as I have in the past, to exercise the rights secured to me by the farhers of my country, and I propose, if I am sout to jult to declare again when I come-out that I shall not, for myself, purchase any produce of the Bucks Stove & Range company. "I repeat that, so far as I am concerned, and let the consequences be what they may, I intend, while at liberty, to declare for the rights guaranteed to me by the organic laws of my country. I am proud of being at American."

Mr. Mitchell said he had grown up as an American with a stepmother so poor that she could not buy bread, and told how he had crept out of bed at night to get his father's soldier cost to keep him worm. "But I want to see the word Ameri-can stand for all the sentiment that is symbolized by the flag of our coun-try." he continued. "I want real lib-erty. I do not believe in the liberty snunctated by some of our courts that men and women should have the right to work themselves to death.

men and women should have the right to work themselves to death. "I do not believe in the liberty enunciated by Judge Tuthill of Chi-cago, who declared unconstitutional the lo-hour law for women, and by that act compelled them to work 14 hours a day."

act compelled them to work is house a day." Mr. Mitchell said that he believed the present proceedings would bring home to the people the necessity of working in concert. "Is the time going to come on our continent when the badge of faithful-ness to labor must be the brand of imprisonment?" he said in conclusion. "Surely I hope not I hope that the government may be so conducted that no citizen may feel that he has not been given justice and an equal right with every other citizen."
