

community could be afflicted. I take it that they are no worse than sewing-machine agents. (Laughter and applause.)

Mr. Hall (assuming an indignant and defiant attitude)—Gentlemen, I belong to that fraternity who is made the butt of ridicule here tonight. Individually I have been made a laughing stock. I do not care for that. Personally, I have frequently and persistently canvassed for orders for machines, and I am not ashamed of it. Why should I be, as long as the avocation is an honest one? There was a sewing-machine agent in this council during a former administration, there may be again. I class among my circle of acquaintances, men who sell sewing machines, who are the peer of any member of this council.

(Forgetting that he was occupying a seat in the council that belonged to another, he continued)—I trust that my constituents will never send me back to this Council. I feel hurt at the treatment accorded me by the license committee.

Mr. Anderson—You are mistaken Mr. Hall. It was not the intent on of the committee to injure or insult you.

Mr. Lynn—I think Mr. Hall has cast improper reflections upon the license committee.

Mr. Anderson—We thought it entirely proper to license the business that you follow, inasmuch as Mr. Walden informed me that you had expressed your willingness to be licensed.

Mr. Hall—I do not recollect having had any such conversation with Mr. Walden. I should like to have him explain.

Mr. Walden (excitedly)—Mr. President, I have been wanting to address this Council two or three times tonight, but strenuous objections have been raised by Mr. Anderson. Now that the shoe pinches I will speak anyway. I emphatically deny ever having made any such representation to Mr. Anderson; he is merely using me as a cat's paw.

Mr. Anderson (leaping over his desk and assuming a pugilistic pose)—You are a liar! a liar, sir!

Mr. Walden (retreating)—I have had no such conversation with you.

Mr. Anderson (advancing towards Walden and shaking his fist)—Come over here you miserable liar-r-r!

Mayor Scott (nervously)—Come to order!

Mr. Anderson (grinding his teeth and swinging his arms in John L. Sullivan style)—Mr. Walden, you called me a liar-r-r. Come to my desk, come half way. (Desperately)—Oh, you LIAR! COME ON I SAY!!

Mayor Scott (summoning his courage)—You must cease this disturbance, gentlemen; (pleadingly) do stop gentlemen, do, oh, do!

Mr. James came to Mayor Scott's rescue and finally restored order by getting in a little speech on an extraneous subject.

When all was peace and quiet, Hall carried his point and with a smile of triumph took his seat with the satisfaction of knowing that a sewing-machine agent can now ply his trade without paying a license.

LICENSE SCHEDULE.

The report of the finance committee with the recommendation of the treasurer, and the license schedule as adopted is herewith presented in full:

Your committee on finance, to whom was referred the annual report of the city treasurer, recommend that the same be received and filed, and so much of it as will be of interest to the general public published.

Referring to the changes recommended in license rates, your committee, after careful consideration, do not consider it would be just to abolish the merchants' license, and allow the tax to remain on other lines of business that pay fully as much tax as the merchants; the city is not in a position at present to do away with this entire revenue; we therefore recommend that the merchants' license remain as it is until such time as the city is in a position to get along without this source of revenue.

In regard to the liquor license, we recommend that no license be issued for a shorter period than six months.

We further recommend the adoption of the attached schedule of license rates, which agree with the recommendations of the treasurer with but few exceptions. The recommendation that each department shall hereafter make a settlement with the treasurer once each month (it to remain optional with the department to make settlements oftener), and that the auditor and treasurer make a full and complete report to the mayor and the city council once each month, we think should be adopted.

We also favor the adoption of the recommendation in regard to the deputy treasurer.

We attach hereto a supplementary report from the treasurer and recommend its adoption. Very respectfully,
