Indignation at Mrs. Stowe's Defense. KIDNAPPING IN MISSOURI. SUSPICIONS OF PRIVATEERING VESSELS. THE GUNBOAT "MARIA" SUNK.

NEW YORK. Gunboat Sunk—Murdere Confesses—Bodies Found—Departure of the Gunboat. NEW YORK 6.—The gunboat Maria which left for Portland, in company with the steamer Miantonomah to participate in the reception of Peabody's remains, was run into at sea by the Miantonomah, and cut down to the water's edge and sunk in fifteen minutes.

WASHINGTON.

Cuban Privateering—Advance of Salary Demanded. WASHINGTON.—A vessel, which arrived at Charleston harbor yesterday, is reported by the Spanish Minister to be a Cuban privateer, armed and filled with men, and among them portions of the crew of the Hornet. It is stated that a U. S. revenue cutter has been sent down from Charleston, with a U. S. marshal aboard, to overhaul her.

ILLINOIS.

Burglar Arrested. CHICAGO.—The Regents of the Michigan State University have decided to open the doors of the institution to all who pass a proper examination, regardless of sex. A notorious burglar, known as "Handy Andy," who passes under the name of Thomas Horner, and who has been a long time operating in this city, and has defied the detectives, was captured yesterday by detective Dixon; he confessed his guilt and was locked up for trial.

MISSOURI.

Kidnapping—Governor's Message. ST. LOUIS.—Dr. C. S. Manchester and wife were arrested this morning for alleged kidnapping of a little girl belonging to Newell Academy, Barnham Weston. Dr. Manchester is the man who attempted to work a miracle on the dead body of Mr. Hutchamp, a few days ago. Governor McLeamy, in his message, calls attention to the peaceful condition of the State; and in view of this fact, asks the consideration of the expediency of removing the political disabilities from those who were participants in the rebellion. He doesn't think it necessary to amend the Constitution to effect this. The Constitution now provides that the legislature may remove all such disabilities after January 1st, '71; and he recommends that this be made a question for discussion during the canvass next fall, so that candidates for the Legislature may run, in part at least, upon this issue. He opposes the revision of the Constitution, but recommends the submitting to the people of the proposition to allow negroes to vote, and another proposition striking out of the Constitution what is known as the double liability clause. The debt of the State is eighteen millions five hundred and ninety-three thousand dollars. The general financial condition is favorable; but the Governor urges strict economy.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Students Killed. MILFORD, PA.—Wm. J. Mann and Henry Boyle, both students at a college in New Jersey, the latter the son of General Boyle, Ky., were run over by the cars to-day and both killed.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Charleston, S. C.—The steam yacht Anna, from New York, put into this port on Tuesday under stress of weather, and to obtain coal. While lying in the stream, the Custom House authorities visited her on complaint of the Spanish consul that she intended violating the neutrality laws. She was seized by the United States Marshal, and placed in charge of two U. S. army officers, who discharged the ship's company. The passengers and most of the crew have taken rooms at an hotel, where they are to await the disposition of the

ship. They are mostly Cubans, Col. Ryan, the Cuban filibuster, and a son of Céspedes being among them. The Anna has a regular clearance, and there was no armament aboard. The case will be heard in the U. S. Court on Friday morning.

OHIO.

Legislative. COLUMBUS, OHIO.—A bill has been introduced, repealing the viable admixture law; also a bill to compel railroad companies consolidating with foreign companies to purchase from stockholders, protesting against consolidating, their stock at the highest market value.

MAINE.

Nominations. AUGUSTA, ME.—The Republicans in the Legislature have nominated L. M. Morrill, U. S. Senator; the Democrats, Isaac Reid, of Waldboro.

FOREIGN NEWS.

SPAIN.

Spantiards Jubilant—Cortes Adjourned. MADRID.—Advices have just been received from New York that the Cuban insurrection has been ended by orders of the Cuban Junta in New York. The news creates profound excitement. MADRID.—The Cortes have adjourned. Just previous to adjournment there was great excitement among the members on hotly disputed questions relating to the ministry and dynasty. There is a rumor that the Montpensier party will make fresh efforts to accomplish their aims. La Impartial says the leaders of the Unionists have refused to enter into the new cabinet which Serrano is endeavoring to form.

ITALY.

Ecumenical Council. ROME.—The second public congregation of the Ecumenical Council commenced this morning; the first was on the occasion of the inauguration of the Council. The ceremonies to-day were not on so grand a scale as those at the opening, and the number of spectators was much smaller. The Pope was present, but there was no procession to the hall of the Council. No opening address was delivered. Mass was celebrated, &c.

WEST INDIES.

The Islands Ready for Sale. ST. THOMAS 30, via HAVANA 6.—Rumors are in circulation that all obstacles to the completion of the sale of the Islands to the United States have been removed; built-in credence is given to the report.

GREAT BRITAIN.

Bullion Decreasing—Humored Riot—Mrs. Stowe's Defense—An Election Fight. LONDON.—The bullion Bank of England has decreased a hundred thousand pounds since last week. There are rumors that a serious riot has occurred at Longford, Ireland, attended with loss of life. An extract from Mrs. Stowe's "Lady Byron Vindicated," containing 1,131 words, was received by the Anglo-American and Atlantic cable last evening, which is published in the Pall Mall Gazette, to-day. The Gazette's correspondent adds. Here in America, the public indignation at the conduct of Mrs. Stowe, in this matter, has only been intensified by the publication of this so called defense. DUBLIN.—The Irish journals report that during the Parliamentary election in Longford, which was bitterly contested and attended with great excitement, the supporters of Martin and the Fenian candidate, H. T. Nugent, had a sharp fight, during which the troops appeared and fired upon the Fenians, who quickly dispersed. A few men were wounded but none killed. At last accounts there had been no further disturbances, but proper precautions had been taken to prevent a renewal of the conflict. The Fenian element is greatly exasperated over the defeat of its candidate.

FRANCE.

Specie Drained—Treach Destroyed—Hausmann's Successor—Censorship to be Suspended. PARIS.—During the week just passed, the heavy outflow of specie from the bank of France has continued. The amount in the vault to-day is \$1,000,000 francs less than last Thursday. MAREUILLES.—Lorillard has blown up and destroyed his Yatch Meteor, which was recently wrecked near Tunis. It is reported that the censorship heretofore exercised over telegrams and the admission of foreign papers will be, at least temporarily, suspended. PARIS.—The Official Journal publishes a decree appointing M. Henry Chevreaux, to succeed Baron Hausmann as prefect of the Seine. Hausmann is relieved of all his administrative functions. This event is regarded as one of prime importance.
